Falcon Five Nips Berkley By 44-39

The Farmington Falcons basketball team conquered their first league foe by beating the Berkley Bears 44-39 Friday night, December 9, on the Farmington court.

The starting line-up for Farmington was J. Rice and J. Spiller, forwards; W. Dryden and D. Nichols, guards, and D. Tyler, center. Berkley grabbed the lead in the initial period on early foul shots. Both Rumburg and Bob Mansfield were early replacements for Farmington. The Falcons came back as the quarter ended, but Berkley led 14-9.

The teams matched baskets early in the second quarter, but in the closing minutes Farmington grabbed the lead on shots by Fawcett and Mansfield. The score at the half was 23-19.

The Falcons raised the score to 32-24 before the Bears closed the margin to 32-29 at the end of the quarter.

Berkley knotted the score at 32-31 in the early minutes of the final quarter. The lead see-sawed back and forth until Farmington gained a 40-39 margin with a minute and a quarter remaining. Berkley desperately tried to steal the ball from Farmington but only fouled the Falcons, who were stalling. Mansfield and Rice took advantage of the new foul rule, which makes all fouls in the last three minutes worth two shots, to post the final score of 44-39.

Mansfield and Rice paced Farmington with 21 and 10 points respectively.

The margin of victory came from the foul line as both teams had the same number of field goals. Farmington hit on 26 per cent of their shots.

This was the Falcons' second victory of the week. Farmington defeated Wayne 50-47 on the Falcon floor December 9.

Jerry Rice and Wayne Dryden were high point men with 17 and 10 points respectively.

Trojan Frosh Quintet Beaten By Falcons 45-17

Clarencville's freshman basketball team dropped its opening game 9 to the Falcon freshman team at Farmington by a wide margin of 45 to 17.

Sammy LaBrecque was high point man for the Trojans with eight points while Bob Flick sparked the Farmington team with 12 points.

BOWLING CONGRESS LISTS LEAGUES IN 45 STATES

WIBC stands for Women's International Bowling Congress, which is an international organization for women to promote interest in the American game of bowling.

The WIBC was organized November 29, 1916, and incorporated October 20, 1919. At the close of the 1951 season, the membership was 582,703 women in 17,885 sanctioned leagues in 45 states including Hawaii, Canada, Alaska and the Canal Zone.

The WIBC to women bowlers is the same as the ABC to men bowlers. Everyone knows about the ABC for they have had a brother, husband, father or friend who has competed in the ABC at some time or another. It has been 25 years since the women bowlers of Detroit entertained the WIBC while the men have entertained the ABC twice during the last twelve years.

For this reason, the public in general in Detroit and Michigan are not too familiar with the WIBC.

The City of Detroit leads all cities in membership in the WIBC with 1,184 leagues and 41,581 individual members for the season of 1951.

The State of Michigan has 85,171 sanctioned women bowlers which leads all states. The states having the largest membership next to Michigan are in order Ohio, New York, Illinois and Wisconsin.

This tournament is open to all women bowlers, high or low average. Everyone has a chance to win and low bowlers can bowl together on the same team.

At this week at the Fort Shelby Hotel in Detroit women city officials from seven Detroit municipalities played their support in making the 1952 Women's International Bowling Congress tournament a record breaker.

Entry blanks may be secured at any bowling alley. The nation is looking to Detroit for an unbreakable record.

Re-State Regulations For Winter Ice Fishing

Dozens of new communities will pop up in Michigan this winter, like mushrooms, though by spring all will dissolve with winter's ice and snow.

The main industry of these communities will be fishing — though some by-products include relaxation, sport and a general quickening of the fisherman's spirits.

But the conservation department points out that ice fishing from these shanty communities will be limited, as usual, by doctrines set forth in the fish law digest.

Shanties must be marked with the owner's name and address in letters at least two inches high. Shanties must be removed before the ice breaks up. Shanty owners may fish on practically all inland waters of the state, except trout lakes and streams listed as closed in the fish law digest. And shanty owners are referred to the 1952 digest for other limitations and regulations.

Generally, bluegills, calico bass and perch provide biggest catches during ice fishing season in the southern lower peninsula. Farther north, walleyed pike and northern pike and muskellunge provide most sport.
