TROJAN QUINTET POSTS FIRST WIN OF LEAGUE PLAY

The Clarencville Trojan basketball team romped to their first league victory of the current season by defeating Holly 35-14 in a close, hard-fought game. This victory marks the first time the Trojans have won a game since the W. O. C. League came, one game ahead of Holly. The Trojans now have a 1-1 league record and a 2-3 overall record.

Clarencville's hope for victory seemed dim early in the first period as Holly took an early lead, which they greatly increased to 17 points at the end of the period. Holly tallied 21 times in the first period while holding Clarencville to a mere four points. The Trojans showed better form in the big second period as they scored 22 points while holding their opponents to 11 points. Clarencville's big drive was marked by Tom Ruttle, who brilliantly scored 9 points, and Bob Townsley, who tallied six times in this big period. The scoreboard at intermission time found the Trojans leading 14-17. In the third period, the Trojans resumed their attack in the third period as they were able to slice Holly's lead to within one point at the three-quarter mark. The Trojans outscored Holly in the third period 14 points to 11. Killeen and Ruttle led the offensive attack in this period as they scored four points each. Clarencville trailed Holly 42-41 going into the final period. The Trojans poured it on both offensively and defensively in the last period as they were able to overcome the faltering Holly team and take the lead. The Trojans racked up another 14 points in the last period as they held the opponents to a mere 3 points. The final score found Clarencville out front 55-45.

Tom Ruttle, playing an outstanding game, led the Trojans' scoring with 15 points. He was also the team's leading rebounder, showing his usual good form. He also sparked the Clarencville offensive attack with 13 points to his credit. The remaining scoring was done by Townsley with 6, Evans and Koch with 6 each, Myers with 4, Phillips with 2 and Mylars with one. The Trojans will play two games

A brilliant fourth quarter rally brought the Farmington Falcons from behind to nip a good Southfield team 42-41. The game was played last Thursday night on the home floor.

The starting line-up for Farmington was W. Dryden and J. Rice at forward, D. Omsus and B. Mansfield at guard and J. Tyler at center. The Falcons had trouble getting started in the first half as Southfield scored in the opening seconds of the game and continued to pile on points. At the end of the first half Farmington was on the short end of a 25-13 score. Dryden, Spallier, Fawcett and Tyler with two, two, four and five respectively, accounted for Farmington's 13 points.

The Falcons showed more fight and spirit in the third period but could only gain one point on the opposition. The score was 35-24 at the end of the third quarter. Rice led the Falcons with three points. Tyler accounted for three and Dryden one.
