

POLICE ARREST DRUNK DRIVER, DISCOVER LOOT

Farmington City Police arrested Raymond Provencher, 19, of 26255 Shilawasse, Detroit 19, last week for driving under the influence of intoxicants.

Provencher was apprehended while driving on Grand River between School Street and Nine Mile Road. He was accompanied by William J. Porter of 19375 Shilawasse, Detroit 12. Porter was charged with driving a car with a broken light and was fined \$15.00 and \$10.00 costs. Provencher received a fine of \$75.00 and \$25.00 costs.

Further investigation revealed other loot including wheel discs, a new pair of shoes, three pairs of sun glasses, a spot light, tire and wheel, a bolt of cotton fabric, a suit and a blanket.

After sentencing in Farmington, the pair were turned over to police at the Fourteenth Precinct Station in Detroit for further questioning.
