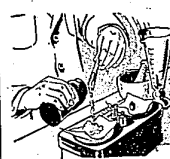

DETROIT PAPER OFFERS CONTEST FOR STUDENTS

The Detroit News is sponsoring a contest for young writers to encourage writing. The Michigan Scholastic awards will be opened to students in public private and parochial schools of the seven counties of Lenawee, Livingston, Macomb, Monroe, Oakland, Washtenaw and Wayne.

All students in grades seven through twelve regularly enrolled in any school may submit entries. The students in the tenth, eleventh and twelfth grades and in the senior division and the junior division is composed of students in grades seven, eight and nine.

Several awards will be given. Five gold achievement keys and 20 certificates in each classification. In addition, each winner of an achievement key will receive a Webster's New Collegiate Dictionary.

The classifications for the senior division are short stories, essays, poetry, review, short short stories, general articles, autobiography, sketches, current affairs, historical articles, radio scripts and drama.

In the journalism department classifications include features, sports, editorial, interview and column writing.

The junior classification covers poetry, short stories and essays. Entries must be in before February 2, 1953. Consult your English teacher.

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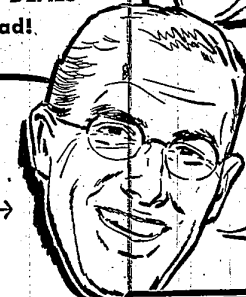
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
