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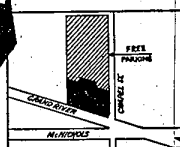

LARRY TOTH JOINS PLYMOUTH GROUP IN FIFTH SEASON

Larry Toth, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Toth, is the most recent addition to the Plymouth Symphony Orchestra. In his senior year at Redford Union High School, Larry is now studying violin under John J. Gajek, the now string instrument teacher of the school. He is the brother of June Toth, now at St. Cecilia's Conservatory in Rome, Italy.

The Plymouth Symphony Orchestra is presenting the second concert of the fifth season at the Redford Union High School where it is sponsored by the Redford Township Symphony Society. The society is composed of a number of Parent Teacher Associations and Mothers' Clubs in the township.

Mr. Gajek has announced a further community participation by the presentation of a chorus of 150 pupils representing various schools in the township. They will sing one a cappella arrangement of a Negro spiritual and two numbers with special orchestral accompaniments.

The concert, which is called a Family Concert by Wayne Dunlap, director of the orchestra, will include musical selections of a popular vein: "William Tell Overture" by Rossini; "Adagio for Strings" by Barber; "Concerto for Toys" by Hendl; "Rosenkavalier Waltzes" by Strauss; "Symphonic Concerto" by Creston; "Poe Voe the Piccolo" by Kleinsinger; and concluding with Sousa's "Stars and Stripes Forever".

STATE ANNOUNCES FERRIES OPERATING EVERY TWO HOURS

The Michigan State Ferry service between Mackinaw City and St. Ignace is now operating on a two-hour winter schedule, Highway Commissioner Charles M. Ziegler announces.

This is the first time the State ferries have operated on a two-hour schedule during the winter season. In past years, the scheduled departure has been three hours apart. This year, however, in an effort to give the public the best possible service, Commissioner Ziegler decided to put the two-hour schedule into effect for the winter months, lasting until sometime in April, depending on ice conditions.

This new schedule has been made possible by the fact that the Department's new ice-breaker ferry, the Vacationland, is a faster ship than the icebreaker Saint Marie, which the department has leased in past years for winter operations, and the new State Ferry docks at St. Ignace have reduced the round trip distance between the two Straits ports by some three miles, both factors helping to cut considerable time off the round trip across the Straits.

I have been studying some of the reports that are being made on the tax situation in Michigan. So far two significant statements can be quoted. The first is from "Michigan Tax Survey 1952" made by a committee of which State Senator George H. H. Fernald is chairman. A quotation from page 15 is:

"The State of Michigan has so widely separated the responsibility for taxation from the power to spend, as to be wasteful of much of the tax money collected from the people of the State;

The diversion of State tax collections to local government has been carried so far that it often tends to destroy the local sense of responsibility at the same time that it has impaired the State government's capacity to pay its own way.

It is none too soon to institute a moderate policy of recapturing for State use a reasonable part of State tax collections which this government has been diverting to the practice in comparable states."

Another quotation is that made by The Detroit Board of Commerce in its magazine under date of January 13, 1953, and which is:

"The 44.77% distribution of the sales tax revenue to school districts is not restricted by constitutional amendment and the formula may be changed by the state legislature. It is expected that the study of the Citizens Advisory Committee will show that, if properly distributed, there are sufficient funds in the 44.77% of the sales tax to support Michigan's school districts, including Detroit schools, without additional taxation."

The two foregoing statements should be kept in mind when reading discussions coming out of Lansing on the question of increasing taxes.

Dean Anthony Begins Retirement July 1

E. L. Anthony, dean of the School of Agriculture at Michigan State College, will leave 41 years of agricultural college teaching and administrative work next July 1. Announcement has been made that, effective that date, he will go on a one-year retirement furlough, with his retirement to become active a year later.

Well known to Michigan farmers, Dean Anthony has been in charge of teaching, research and extension programs in agriculture at Michigan State since 1932—more than 20 years. In the 20 years before that, he taught and handled administrative duties at Pennsylvania State College and the University of West Virginia and headed the dairy department at Michigan State.

His leadership in Michigan State's program of international relationships, in giving technical assistance to agriculture in Colombia, India, Oklahoma and other localities, has brought Michigan wide recognition in the Point Four program. The University of Missouri, where Dean Anthony graduated in 1912, granted him an honorary Doctor of Science degree last spring.

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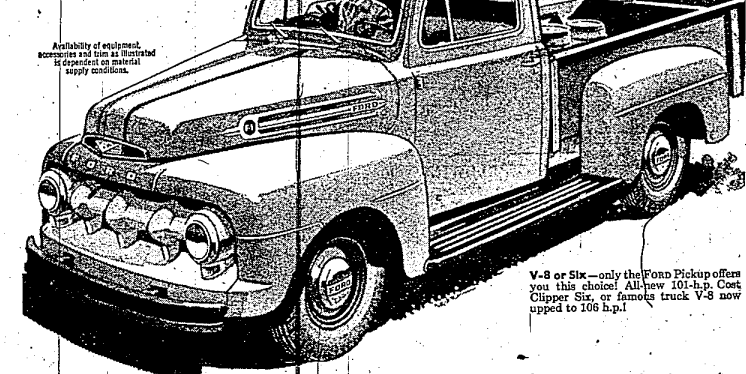
