AMERICAN LEGION TO SPONSOR SPEECH CONTEST

The American Legion will sponsor a National High School Oratorical Contest on or before March 13.

The subject will emphasize attendant duties and citizens' obligations. It will be on some phase of the U. S. Constitution.

The contest will be judged on the originality of speeches and delivery must be from 10 to 12 minutes. Extemporaneous subjects will stem from all parts of the Constitution.

Scholarships will be given to the three state finalists amounting to \$300, \$200 and \$100 respectively. National winners will receive \$4,000, \$2,500, \$1,000 and \$400 scholarships.

Farmington Country Club Plans Now In Progress

According to word received last week, plans for a Farmington Country Club are rapidly taking shape and from all indications the club will be set for a formal opening around May 1, 1954.

Membership in the proposed club will be private and limited to 350 members. Formal organization will take place next fall when election of a board will be held.

The club, which will be located at Haggerty and Twelve Mile Road, will feature an eighteen-hole golf course. Work on the course is slated to get under way this summer.

The clubhouse will be constructed in colonial style and will incorporate air conditioning. Present plans call for a dining room, bar, pro shop, locker room and showers.

An architectural sketch of the proposed plan will be on display at the Haron River Hunting and Fishing Club in the near future.

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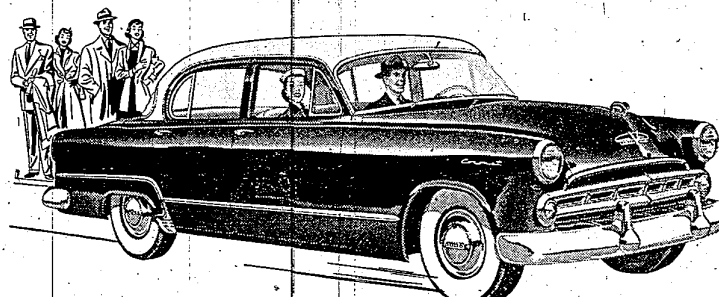
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
