Speaking of TV, as we just did (barely), a fellow in the shop is of the opinion that many cars on the other today would be much better under it!

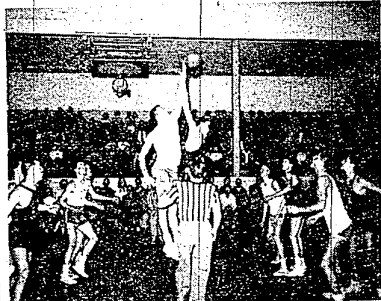

## FALCON TEAM LOSES TO VIKINGS OF WALLED LAKE

The Farmington Falcons' scoring punch was squelched by the Walled Lake Vikings after the Falcons scored 17 points in the opening quarter. The Falcons dropped their fifth straight game last Friday night, 53-43.

Farmington's starting line-up for the game was: W. Dryden and E. Klees, forwards; W. Maki and B. Mansfield guards; and D. Tyler, center.

Farmington started fast in the first quarter with good screening and passing, allowing them to grab a 17-11 lead. Tyler and Maki put in six and five points respectively to lead the scoring. Dryden and Klees had five and four points. The Falcons, scoring only seven points in the second period, managed to hold on to a slim two-point lead at the half, 24-22. Rice tallied four of the seven for Farmington.

Walled Lake scored 15 points in the third period to Farmington's three baskets to gain a seven-point lead going into the final quarter. Tyler, Maki and Mansfield accounted for Farmington's three baskets.

The Falcons came within five points of knotting the score but the Vikings pulled away. Mansfield and Tyler scored six and four points respectively to lead Farmington's fourth quarter efforts.

For the whole game Dick Tyler paced the Falcons with 12 points. The game this week is at Waterford on Friday, February 13.

## Remind Women Bowlers Of Detroit Tournament

Certainly no woman bowler wants to miss the W. I. B. C. tournament to be held in the City of Detroit beginning April 9.

This is the first time that this championship event has been held in Detroit for 25 years and no doubt it will be held in Detroit again. For the woman in this area, it is the chance of a lifetime—no transportation or hotel expenses—just the entry fee.

The W. I. B. C. tournament is held once a year to determine the women champions of the world. Each year it is held in a different city and women from all over the United States, Canada, Alaska, Hawaii and the Panama Canal Zone travel to the city holding the tournament to bowl.

It was held in St. Louis, Missouri, in 1951 Seattle, Washington, was the site. In 1954 Syracuse, New York, will entertain. But, this year of 1953 Detroit is the choice city for outstanding bowling event for women and it is estimated that 20,000 women will converge upon Detroit during the life of the tournament.

## 'How To Catch 'Em' To Be Taught At U-M
