

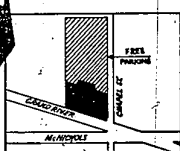
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Catholic Ladies Plan Pre-Lenten Card Party

State Lists Business On February 12 Agenda

A brief agenda will face the conservation commission in its meeting in Lansing today and tomorrow.

Department recommendations for concession operation in 18 state parks is listed for discussion.

Land acquisitions include recommended purchases of 355 acres of hunting lands for \$4,700; fishing sites on Hamilton Lake in Dickinson County and Indian Lake in Iron County and 450 acres of game land additions to five state projects for \$13,500 under the federal Pittman - Robertson program.

Other agenda items include land exchanges in administered units, lease authorizations for copper mining in Ontonagon and Houghton Counties.



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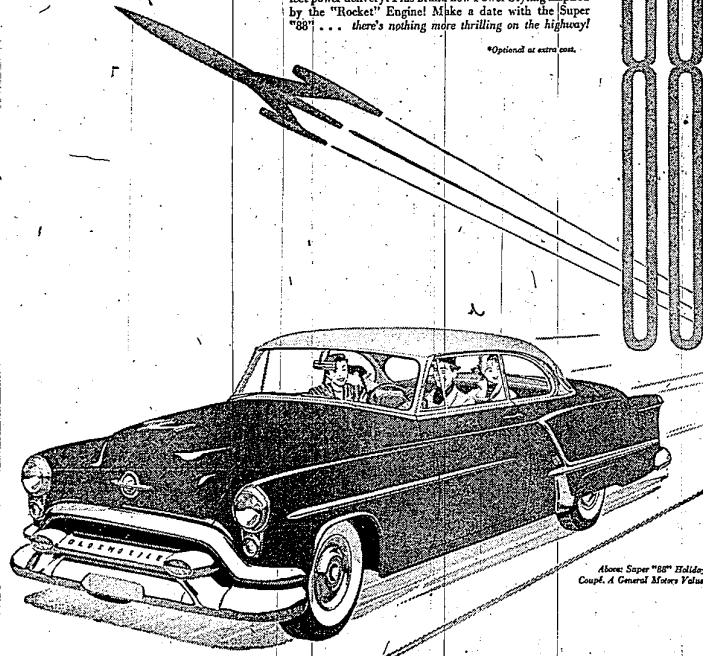
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
