

Nine Candidates Seek Nomination In Two Township Contests Monday

Farmington Township voters will go to the polls Monday, February 16, to nominate various candidates who in turn will run in the regular election in April.

In an effort to better inform the voters as to the qualifications of the candidates The Enterprise is running the following biographical sketches. The bulk of this material has been furnished through the courtesy of the North Farmington District Civic Association. The information is confined to those candidates who are opposed for nomination and who filed nominating petitions.

R. LEWIS (Bob) BROWN, candidate for trustee. Resident of township for 3 1/2 years. Occupation: manager, Klipfel and Company, insurance counselors, Detroit and Royal Oak. Education: Graduate of Albion College, Albion, Michigan, with majors in political science, accounting and business administration. During 1952, worked with the group that founded the Trinity Episcopal Church, Farmington, and has been a member of the Bishop's Committee since its formation. Also a member of Alpha Phi Gamma, a national journalistic honorary society.

WARD EAGLE, candidate for trustee. Lifetime resident of the township. Occupation: farmer. Education: high school graduate. Experience and other qualifications: 12 years on Township Board.

FRED G. MENKE, candidate for trustee. Township resident 36 years, semi-retired. Education: one year, Wayne University. One township office held was constable. Lived in township in old caucus days. Clarencville Recreation Commission, P.T.A., Past president of Farmington Exchange, Member of Clarencville Optimists, Past president of Civic League of Farmington, V.F.W. member, Farmington City and Township Good Fellowship, Legion member, Chairman of Clarencville Red Cross.

RICHARD E. (Dick) PRIEBE, candidate for trustee. Born and educated in Detroit. Former resident of Southfield Township. Resident of Farmington Township 12 years. Qualifications: Participation in township, business and school affairs. Present trustee and past president of the Clarencville School Board, chairman of the advisory board, Section 36 Water System, Township Receiver. Banking and insurance experience, Supervisory and sales experience in

the dairy industry. **THOMAS H. TARDY**, candidate for trustee. Resident of township 18 years. Occupation: Farmington Township sanitation and zoning inspector. Education: B. S. degree in electrical engineering, Virginia Military Institute. Experience and other qualifications: Public School principal, two years; U. S. Army, World War I; electrical engineer, Detroit United (East-West Michigan) Railway, 15 years; Ford Motor Company, two years; associate engineer, Walter T. Fishleigh Consulting Engineering Co., four years; Justice of the peace, Farmington Township, six years; member Farmington Township Board, 3 1/2 years.

C. FREDERICK WESTLAKE, candidate for trustee. Resident of township 18 years. Occupation: safety supervisor, three years; the Detroit Edison Company, 27 years. Education: high school and engineering at University of Florida. Experience and other qualifications: 30 years in construction, engineering and surveying, 24 with the Edison company; four years on Township Board of Review.

EDWARD SHAFER, candidate for trustee. Occupation, employed as clerk for the New York Central Railroad. Resident of Farmington Township for 20 years.

HOWARD E. ELDREDGE, candidate for Clerk. Township resident 18 years. Occupation: sales engineer. Education: high school, business college, short extension courses.

HARRY MCCRACKEN, candidate for Clerk. Occupation, fruit grower. Former teacher and State Representative. Resident of Farmington Township most of his life. Served as Supervisor on the Township Board before becoming Township Clerk.
