First is the news about the expected widening and resurfacing of Orchard Lake Road. The first portion of the project, from 14 Mile Road south to 11 Mile Road, is expected to get under way this spring. The balance of the road, south to Grand River, is on the schedule for 1954.

The second parcel of good news pertains to the authorization by the State Highway Department for the installation of stop-and-go signal lights at Grand River and Middlebelt Road. It is expected that the installation will be made sometime this spring.

A lot of urging by the residents of the community as well as the expenditure of a lot of paper and ink have been made on these two projects. At last they appear to be a reality. Together they should insure safer, more comfortable diving for Farmington residents.

The improvement of Orchard Lake Road has long been a vital problem in this community. It is one of the oldest original sections of concrete in the county. Not only is Orchard Lake Road the main connecting link between Farmington and Pontiac, the County Seat, it is also a principal route for commercial carriers and school buses. The widening and resurfacing of the road will insure safer driving and will bring Farmington much closer to the center of county facilities and activities.

With the increase in traffic, and thus the increase in accidents at the intersection, the installation of lights has become more and more urgent. This does not mean that the presence of lights will eliminate all accidents, but it should greatly reduce them and allow a smoother flow of traffic. Announcement of these two progressive steps is recognition in itself of the increasing growth and importance of the Farmington community.


