The new schedule incorporates a \$300 increase in the annual income of beginning teachers with four years of training. Several minor changes were also made in the annual increment of instructors. The Board unanimously approved the recommendations of the superintendent's office on the matter of salaries.

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Red Cross Sets 1953 Fund Drive

Volunteer chairman who will guide the 1953 fund drive of Oakland County Chapter, American Red Cross, are completing campaign arrangements this week after the February 4 "kick-off" dinner at Christ Church, Cranbrook.

Some 100 leaders from this county cities, towns and villages left the dinner-meeting inspired to raise the record county goal of \$178,369 — local share of the \$3,000,000 national quota — in the 31 drive days of March.

Mildred Bennett, chapter executive secretary, presided at the dinner after Gar A. Sweeney of Royal Oak, was unexpectedly called to Cleveland.

"Our executive committee met and discussed this goal," Mrs. Bennett said.

"At first, it just didn't seem possible that we could rally our forces and get the coverage to raise this much money."

"But," she said, "we have in this chapter the three needed things to raise that money: people, conviction and coverage."

The chapter executive told volunteers that "you are the people" and the conviction they have within themselves. Coverage, she said, is simply "a matter of making sure that everyone has the opportunity to give and to help meet the Red Cross standard of people helping people."

"Only \$61,000 has been raised for the Red Cross," she said, "in local United Fund campaigns; leaving a volunteer goal of more than a hundred thousand dollars yet to bring in."

"I think we have the finest Red Cross Chapter in the country," she said. "Go forth — God bless you! — and raise that money."

A recording by E. Roland Harriman, president of the American Red Cross, told of the Red Cross obligation to collect 2,000,000 pints of blood to be processed into plasma globulin to fight paralyzing effects of polio. Red Cross is asking everyone, everywhere, to donate blood — so that some 2,000,000 youngsters may be protected by the dread disease this summer. Some \$7,000,000 of the national Red Cross goal will go to pay the costs of processing the blood.

"We need donors by the million," Harriman said.

"We'll have to depend on the great and generous heart of America to furnish both the money and the blood."

Mrs. Alfred Barnes, South Oakland campaign chairman, singled out the Board of Appeal as the leaders for recognition. Among them were Mrs. Glenn Hicks and Mrs. R. L. Murray of Royal Oak; Mrs. Don McMillan and Mrs. A. A. Simmons of Ferndale; Mrs. G. F. Morris of Franklin; Mrs. George Burnham of Southfield and Mrs. Robert Townsend, past campaign chairman, of Huntington Woods.

She also introduced Mrs. Leonard Liss of Troy; Mrs. William McCartney and Mrs. C. Burch of Royal Oak Township; Mrs. Mel Stevens of Farmington, and Mrs. Mary Lenz and Mrs. Joe DeVriendt of Farmington; Mrs. Roy Conrad of Berkley and Mrs. Courtney W. Eld of Huntington Woods.

Dairy Adds New Machine For Bottling In Cartons

The Farmington Dairy has added a new piece of equipment, which, according to owner Joseph Himmelspach, will increase the dairy's service to its customers by offering milk in disposable cartons.

The machine is being utilized on a lease basis from a Detroit concern and will be put into use in approximately one week. It is capable of putting out 20 quart, pint or half-pint of milk per minute. The process includes forming, waxing, sealing and stapling the paper bottles.

Much of the machine is constructed of stainless steel and will facilitate the cleaning procedure, said Himmelspach.

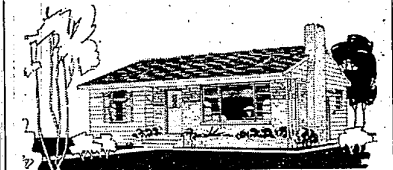

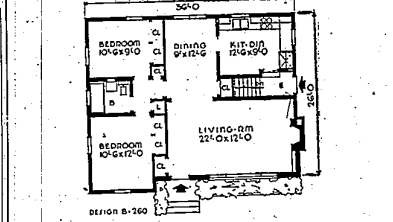
