The Detroit Council of Churches' nationally known, noonday Lenten Services begin Ash Wednesday, February 18, at Central Methodist Church, Woodward at Grand Circus Park. The services are held daily, Monday through Friday, at 12:10 to 12:50 p.m. For those who cannot attend, the service is broadcast over WJW twice daily, at 7:00 p.m. and again at 12:05 a.m., just after midnight.

The first week's speaker will be Dr. Robert J. McCracken, pastor of Riverside Church, New York City, where he succeeded Dr. Harry Emerson Fosdick. He will be introduced on Wednesday by Bishop Richard S. Emrich, president of the Detroit Council of Churches; on Thursday by Mr. William T. Gossett, vice president and general counsel for the Ford Motor Company; and on Friday by Mrs. Theodore Brahm, president of United Church Women of Detroit. Mr. Gossett was for many years chairman of the Board of Trustees of Dr. McCracken's church in New York City.

Dr. G. Merrill Lenox, executive director of the Detroit Council of Churches, apprises Dr. McCracken as "one of the world's outstanding pulpits personalities in great demand everywhere. We are very fortunate to get him to Detroit," Dr. Lenox explains.

Dr. Lenox added further, "We have this year as strong a group of noonday Lenten speakers as has ever been scheduled for this series. I earnestly hope each speaker of the series will give each speaker a large hearing."

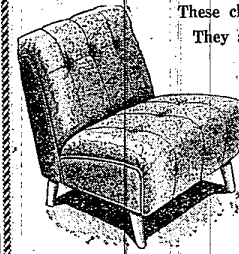
