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Farmington Pastor Featured On Detroit Television Program

A spiritual message was brought to the people of the Detroit-Farmington area by the Rev. Carl H. Schultz, pastor of the Farmington Salem Evangelical and Reformed Church.

Rev. Schultz appeared on the program "Meditations," which was telecast over WJBK, Channel 2, on Thursday, February 12, at 9:30 a.m.

The Farmington pastor made his appearance at the invitation of the Detroit Council of Churches. In his opening words for the broadcast, Rev. Schultz said:

"I invite you to hear again the promise of universal brotherhood written in Matthew 11:28. And too, the beauty and urgency of its application as written in Isaiah 52:7."

Then Rev. Schultz continued his sermonette as he told how must take his responsibility of continuing Christ's work on earth. "Before God we are all brothers," he said. "Come unto Me, all ye who are weary, and I will give you rest. This is the promise. Accepting this is the true, we lay stress upon its application."

"How beautiful are the feet of him who brings good tidings, who publishes peace."

Friends: This day is not yet too much with us but that we can launch ourselves in the world of good-will. There are so many areas in life where we can each do as Lincoln said he tried always to do: "Pluck a thistle and plant a flower."

"Jesus did just that and multitudes followed him. On those multitudes He looked with compassion, so much in need of good-will and a fair sense of brotherhood."

"Is not ours a day of such multitudes? And who shall publish the tidings of good-will? Teachers? Social Workers? Teachers? Yes, of course, but this can't be left with them alone. In this we must all be ready-handed and beautiful footed; so Annie Johnson Philippi expressed:

"Christ has no hands, but our hands
To do His work today;
He has no feet, but our feet
To lead men in His way."
Nor must we forget she wrote also:
"He has no tongue but our
Tongues
To tell men how He died."

In his closing words Rev. Schultz made reference to the wisdom of little children in the matter of God. He used his little

daughter as an example. "A few days ago I viewed this telecast with our five year old daughter. During a hymn two pictures were shown on the screen: The Lord's Supper, Jesus breaking bread and sharing it with His disciples; and Jesus Blessing the Little Children. Mary Jane, looking at the pictures, commented: 'That's God, isn't it?' I said, 'No, that is Jesus.' To this her answer was very simple, but it made adult wisdom stand in awe of a child's understanding; for she said: 'I can't always tell the difference between God and Jesus, can I?'

At such time one does not tell a five year old child, who sees God in the sharing and blessing of Jesus, that we have no pictures of God; for in a child's unsophisticated faith, God and Jesus alike are the embodiment of good, kindness, brotherhood. Of this embodiment we are the heralds.
