

FALCONS LOSE FINAL GAME, 49-46; HOLLY STOPS TROJAN FIVE, 38-36

Free Tosses Win For Southfield

Southfield High came surging back in the late minutes to slip the Farmington Falcons 49-46 in a close, hard-fought see-saw battle on the Farmington floor Friday, February 27. The loss of the Falcons' tenth of the season, dropped Farmington into a third place deadlock with Southfield for the season's play in the InterLakes League.

The Falcon starting line-up for the game was D. Osmus and W. Maki at guards, J. McCaffrey and J. Rice at forwards and D. Tyler at center.
Dick Tyler's quick basket showed Farmington into an early lead in the first quarter. John McCaffrey, latest addition to the Farmington varsity, took the rebounds well and hit for two baskets in the early stages. Southfield grabbed a 16-12 lead at the close of the first quarter.

The Falcons gained a point during the second quarter, but Southfield led at the intermission 23-20.
Early in the third quarter Farmington caught fire on long shots by Dryden and Maki. The Falcons proceeded to slowly cut down the lead and finally jumped into a 37-34 lead at the quarters end.

Farmington widened the lead to five points before Dryden and Tyler fouled out. Southfield's tosses advantage of their charity tosses to gain a three-point victory in the closing rounds.

The Falcons were led by John McCaffrey, who contributed five points and did an excellent job in clearing the boards.

Farmington High's Reserve basketball team won its last game of the season by the score of 50-39.

The Clarenceville Trojans quieted wound up their basketball schedule Friday, February 27, as they were dropped in a heart-breaking game by Holly 38-36. This low-scoring contest featured great defensive ball on the part of both teams.

The Trojans got off to a bad start in the first quarter as they allowed their opponents to rack up 15 points, while they were able to score only 8 times.
The Trojans picked up ground in a low-scoring second period, as they tallied 7 times while holding Holly to 4 points. The score stood at intermission time found the Trojans trailing Holly 15-15.

The Trojans matched Holly basket for basket in the third period, as both teams racked up ten points to boost the score to 25-25 in Holly's favor at the three-quarter mark.
Clarenceville tried desperately to overcome the slim Holly lead in the final lap of the game, but they fell two points short of tying the score.
