The theme of this year's show is "Spring's Awakening". Practically all of the gardens that cover the Dosselsum and the Agricultural Building and Annex have spring flowers in full bloom. In the collection the estate gardens of Mrs. John S. Newberry and Mr. and Mrs. Edgar B. Whitcomb have the spring theme as well as the contemporary gardens sponsored by such nurseries as Dincer's, Pontiac, Greening and Ilgenfritz.

Mrs. Newberry's "Spring Tulip Garden" is red and white tulips with rhododendrons and flowering shrubs as background material. The Whitcomb garden consists of azaleas, lilacs, tulips, daffodils, hyacinths and other spring flowers.

Another garden that has a colorful array of spring flowers is the model garden sponsored by the Detroit Department of Parks and Recreation. It can be altered to fit any size city lot. Those interested can get plans on how and what to plant and how to landscape their lots.

There is also a cactus garden sponsored by the Detroit Cactus Society and the Audubon Society is going all out in its display featuring family life in the woods. It shows animals and birds in their natural habitat, and how a family can enjoy itself on camping trips, etc. Ed and Ann Doyes special tape recording of over 30 bird calls native to Michigan is proving of great interest to nature lovers.
