The 1952-53 basketball season is now a part of the record books for both the Farmington Falcon and Clarencville Trojan squads. Probably the two outstanding highlights of the season for both clubs was the fact that the Falcons went to the second round of the District Playoffs and that the Trojans' Rutilla received honorable mention on the mythical All-State Team.

The Falcons ended their season with a 7 win, 11 loss record. In the scoring column four Falcons topped the 100 mark, with Dick Tyler being top with 183 points.

Other Farmington players in this particular department were Jerry Rice, Wayne Dryden and Bob Mansfield.

The Trojans ended up fifth in their league, having won 5 of 15 starts. In the scoring department Rutilla paced his teammates with 158 counters. The only other Trojan player to pass the hundred mark was Pat Killeen, who completed a season total of 123.

Nine Falcon players ended high school competition this year due to the fact of their graduation. L. Paschke, E. Kites, J. Covart, D. Nichols, D. Osmus, P. Lemon, B. Spaller, B. Mansfield and D. Tyler have now hung up their bins and who basketball uniforms for the last time. The Falcons have elected Wayne Dryden to captain next year's team.

Only three Trojans will be lost to the team through graduation. Jack Phillips, Glenn Evans and Bob Townsley won't be back next year but Coach Robert Selke, with a nucleus of veterans, should have a good year in 1953-54.

### ATHLETIC ASSN. ISSUES STATEMENT ON 1953 SEASON

The financial income from sports ended with the last basketball game of the season, and the latest report of the Athletic Association shows that the 1953 sports season will end with a deficit of approximately \$2,500.

The football season ended with a total of \$1171.80 in returns with the Walled Lake game topping all others with \$375.04.

Walled Lake also drew the highest attendance in the basketball season with \$238.95.

The basketball game between the seniors and the faculty grossed \$421.47 to give the basketball season an income of \$2091.29.

The entire income for the year was \$3,263.72. Subtracting the deficit of last year you get a negative \$1224.92. Add current obligations of \$372.53 and the track and baseball bills of approximately \$350 and there is a total deficit of \$2547.85 for the fiscal year of 1953.

It is hoped by the Association that this week end's carnival will erase about \$1000 of this deficit. J. Shuts

### 1953 Fishing Sites. List Now Available

The new 1953 listing of public fishing sites is now available free from the fish division in Lansing.

The list contains locations of public frontages in lakes and streams throughout the state, as authorized by the conservation department since the program started in 1939.

Nearly 49,000 acres are now owned by the public under the program, and provide access to 380 lakes and 177 streams.

Nine new stream sites and 23 lake access points have been added to the list since last year.

The list is contained in a green cover this year and gives general information about the program.
