(Continued from Page Two) mult Auditor General John Martin to okay checks to local school systems for \$32,000,000 this month. This is the total of expected corporate fees plus current shares of sales taxes. Mr. Martin figures the state will owe school systems \$24,000,000 by the end of the fiscal year, June 30. This amount he hopes to offset early in July with an advance distribution of \$23,000,000 to schools.

The state still faces, however, a deficit of some \$55,000,000 and sooner or later, probably later, must find a way to return to solvency. Among other bills and proposals in various stages of consideration by the legislature is one which would eliminate sentences where a man is given 10-15 years. These were listed by Jackson prisoners as an important contributing cause in recent riots. Prison authorities, Justice H. Farmington U-M Student Dances in Girl's Play

Unsupervised charm plus unbridled imagination were displayed by the 200 University of Michigan women producing the annual Junior Girls' Play, "Vanity Fair". A tradition for 15 years, JGP opened in Ann Arbor March 19 and closed March 25 in Detroit.

Ann Plumton, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Plumton of 23001 Maple in Farmington, was a member of the dancing cast. Written, directed and staged by the junior women, the show was a musical comedy boasting original music and dances for the eight dancing choruses. Although the cast of 120 had been rehearsing for five weeks, the plot started a carefully guarded secret.

The first performance was given solely for senior women, who traditionally heckle the juniors and demand that they repeat their lines.

Another bill would alter the Hutchinson Act to require a fact finding commission to handle labor disputes. Present law prohibits strikes by employees in public service and labor officials think it only fair to counterbalance the cost of strike by providing some other recourse.

Approved by the House is a bill which boosts from \$2,500 to \$10,000 the maximum fine for gambling conspiracies. This was increased because the highest fines sometimes did not take the profit out of such enterprise — one defendant was fined \$2,500 and \$10,000 court costs, not an ideal way to prove that crime does not pay.

Investigations into the operations of Eloise or Wayne County General Hospital were demanded in the legislature last week to find the truth about charges that mental patients are mishandled and to see if Civil Service is being used to back employees in jobs at the cost of discipline. Requests for investigation have also been made to check into charges that patients at Lapeer, a state mental hospital, are institutionalized illegally and are made to work for townspeople for little or no wages.

The earliest opening in the history of Lake Superior took place Sunday when one lock of the St. Marys Falls Canal became available to shipping. The Sault locks have never opened earlier than March 23.

Mother in Iron Lung Bears Five Pound Girl

At Herman Kiefer Hospital recently, a five pound 12 ounce baby girl was born to a 26 year old mother who had been in an iron lung since September. Dr. Joseph G. Mohler, commissioner of health, says that the courageous young mother, Mrs. Verna Nash, and her baby daughter, Kim, both are doing well. Mrs. Nash is a graduate nurse.

The birth is the first of its kind at Herman Kiefer Hospital and is unusual in that it was normal. Cesareanians are most births under these circumstances. Until yesterday, the patient was not able to be out of the iron lung for longer than five minute periods. Careful and detailed plans had been made for the birth. The patient was taken out of her lung and her head encased in a "bubble" — plastic dome — into which air was pumped and forced into her lungs. This was kept up for more than an hour.

Of 375 poliomyelitis patients admitted to Herman Kiefer Hospital in 1952, 32 were expectant mothers and of these, 19 had some form of paralysis. Mrs. Nash is the only one of these 32 who are in the hospital now.

There are 15 other polio patients in addition to Mrs. Nash who require the use of an iron lung at Herman Kiefer.
