

LEGAL NOTICE

PROPOSED ORDINANCE
An Ordinance to Require Owners and/or Occupants of Real Property to Furnish and Place Curbs, etc.

Section 1. No owner or occupant of any real property located within the City of Farmington shall place or permit to be placed any gravel, sand, earth, dirt or other material on or in front of such real property which will hinder or interfere with the free flow and drainage of water therefrom to any ditch, culvert, street, gutter or natural water drainage course lying adjacent to and/or abutting such real property.

Section 2. No owner or occupant of any real property located within said City shall place any gravel, sand, earth, dirt or other material in any ditch, culvert, street, gutter or natural water drainage course in front of adjoining and/or abutting such property that will hinder or interfere with the free flow and drainage of water in, on, over or through any such ditch, culvert, street, gutter or natural water drainage course.

Section 3. Whenever the City Manager, or such other person as the Council of the City may hereafter appoint, shall deem it necessary that any culvert be installed, replaced or repaired, that any culvert be covered with earth, gravel or other material, or that material be removed from any ditch, culvert, street, gutter or natural water drainage course, and that any one or more of the matters and services should be provided and paid for by the owner or owners of the adjoining and/or abutting real property, he shall make a determination thereof and shall cause written notice of such determination to be given or sent by ordinary mail to the owner or owners of such real property, which notice shall require the owner or owners of the matters required by such determination on or before a certain date, and which shall not be less than 10 days after the giving or mailing of such notice.

Section 4. The size, quality, kind, grade and the number of culverts to be installed and the kind, grade, quality and amount of all other material to be installed, placed, used and/or deposited under the provisions of this ordinance shall be subject to the prior approval of the City Manager, and all work and labor performed under this ordinance shall be done under his control and supervision and subject to his approval.

Section 5. Whenever the owner or owners of such real property shall have failed, neglected and/or refused to comply with the terms of any determination hereof, or when the City Manager has before said notice to be furnished by or on behalf of the City, and upon completion thereof he shall certify the amount of all charges and costs thereof to the City Clerk. Upon receipt of such certificate by the City Clerk, the City Clerk shall at once become a debt due and owing to the City by the owner or owners of such real property.

Section 6. Upon receipt of such certificate the City Clerk shall certify the amount thereof to the City Assessor who shall immediately spread the same upon the tax roll of the City and the amount thereof shall be levied as a lien against such adjoining and/or abutting real property in the same manner and to the same extent as other City taxes, and the Assessor shall immediately notify the City Treasurer thereof.

Section 7. Within 5 days after certificate of such debt and tax levy, the City Treasurer shall send by ordinary mail to the owner or owners of such adjoining and/or abutting real property a bill or statement of the sum due to the City by reason of material and labor furnished by the City under the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 8. All sums due to the City under the provisions of this ordinance may be paid to the City without collection fee or interest at any time up to and including the last day of the month following the month in which the City Clerk shall have received the certificate as provided in Section 5 hereof. On the first day of the second month following receipt of such certificate by the City Clerk, there shall be added to the amount thereof a collection fee of 4 per cent. On the first day of each and every month following the month in which such collection fee has been added, there shall be added to the original amount due to the City and the collection fee, an interest charge of one-half per cent of the total amount thereof.

Section 9. Failure to give or mail any notice or failure to mail any bill or tax statement, required by the provisions of this ordinance, shall not invalidate or operate to discharge or release any debt or sum due to the City under the provisions hereof.

Section 10. Failure to give or mail any notice or failure to mail any bill or tax statement required under the provisions of this ordinance, shall not invalidate or operate to discharge or release any debt or sum due to the City spread against any real property under the provisions hereof.

Section 11. Failure to receive any notice, bill or tax statement provided for in this ordinance shall not invalidate or operate to discharge or release any debt or sum due to the City under the provisions hereof.

Section 12. Failure to receive any notice, bill or tax statement provided for in this ordinance shall not invalidate or operate to discharge or release any debt or sum due to the City under the provisions hereof.



Little Leaguers Answer First Call

DRILLS UNDER WAY AS PLAYERS LOOK AHEAD TO JUNE 6

Nearly 200 potential Little League Baseball players of various shapes and sizes turned out for the first training call on Wednesday evening, April 23.

The latter part of the session was devoted to the collection of waiver cards by Don Hossler and his assistants, after which time the candidates were split up according to age groups and the positions each desired to play.

Following the splitting up, the entire athletic field was dotted with small groups of potential pitchers, infielders, outfielders, etc., each under a veteran positioner, each man showing to insure his berth as a "regular".

Several of the early practice sessions have been cancelled due to weather conditions and wet grounds. As soon as weather permits regular practice will get under way in preparation for the opening day double-header on Saturday, June 6, with the Cubs meeting the Tigers and Yankees going against the Cardinals.

The Little League schedule includes 36 games which will be played between June 6 and August 1. A copy is reproduced on this page for the benefit of the readers who would like to clip the schedule to keep for reference.

More managers for Little League farm teams are being sought by league officials, who point out that the farm system is a very important part of the work in that boys playing on the teams this year will be coming up to the regular league next season.

The officials also point out that excellent facilities for the farm teams now exist and they explain that these teams only play half as many games as does the regular league.

This would mean that managers of farm teams would only be required to devote one night per week to the team.

In case that eligible players have not as yet submitted their application to league officials, they are still welcome to come out for tryouts at the Little League, according to word received this week.

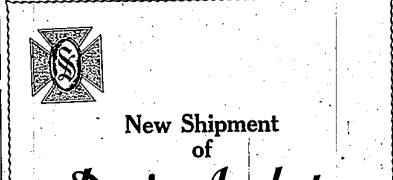
