Trojan Thinclads Post Second Win

The Clarencville High School thinclads notched their second victory of the current season as they overpowered Keego Harbor 59 1/2 to 49 2/3.

The Trojans started out the meet with Dick Robenault placing second in the high hurdles.

Clarencville took the lead in the meet by placing first in the medley relay. Todd, Douglas, Meyer and Gauli outclassed Keego in the event.

Don Knapp broke the high school record for the 100 yard dash as he easily notched the first spot in this event with a 10.4 time.

Richard Wood and Ken Jacobson placed first and second respectively to win the one mile race and add to the Trojan score.

Gene Garbin placed first and Don Douglas placed in the 440 yard dash to keep Clarencville in the lead in the meet.

Chuck Meyer placed first in the 150 yard hurdles for the Trojans as he took first place.

Knapp added to the Trojans' score in the 220 yard dash as he ran second.

In the 550 yard run Leland Wilcox and Don Knapp placed second and third.

Dick Robenault and Lawrence Westburg placed second and third in the field events for Clarencville to add to the score.

Melvin Koch out-threw everybody to place first in the shot put event and Bill Lawrason came in right behind him for second spot.

Pat Killen and Paul Vandenberg ended the meet as they tied for the top spot in the high jump with leaps of five feet.

Don Knapp broke the broad jump record for the school by jumping 19 1/2 feet.

TRENTON DOWNS FARMINGTON 73-36 IN DUAL MEET

The Farmington track team was downed by Trenton by the lopsided score of 73-36 April 28 at Trenton.

Arnold Corbit paced the Falcons by scoring 9 points as he cleared 9 feet 9 inches to take first in the pole vault, and jumped 18 feet 3 inches to notch second in the broad jump. The only other first was won by Bob Mansfield in the mile run.

Second places were taken by J. Bryan in the 880, D. Grimsaw in the 440, R. Goers in the shot put, and D. Nichols in the high jump. D. Sutherland, D. Goulet, P. Lemon, P. Kneaves and W. Knapp scored the rest of the points by taking thirds.

FARMINGTON TAKES TWO-MILE RELAY AT MT. PLEASANT

The Farmington Falcons grabbed the two-mile relay for the third straight year in the Central Michigan Relays at Mt. Pleasant on May 1.

Foxy Fox Outfoxes Would-Be Benefactor

The call of the wild was too much for one young red fox, reared incaptivity last year by Margaret Bishop of Elsie, the conservation department reports.

The high school biology student was given one of three young foxes taken from a den last spring by her biology teacher, Roland Schandt, and a department field worker.

Miss Bishop fixed the fox with a collar and light chain — too light it turned out. The animal broke away in October and wasn't seen again that year.

But recently, biology teacher Schandt trapped the fox, still wearing the collar, about 22 miles from Elsie and five miles from where first captured.

Mansfield Sets New School Record In Winning 2nd Annual Pentathlon

Bob Mansfield won the second annual Pentathlon at Farmington High. Mr. Harold Humble, track coach, announced this week.

The Pentathlon is an intrasquad track meet consisting of the 100 yard dash, broad jump, high jump, shot put and half mile run.

In placing first, Mansfield set a new school record of 318 points by breaking the old one of 306 made by Dean Whitehead last season.

Mansfield, a senior and one of this year's track co-captains, has been active in track and cross country since entering Farmington High in his sophomore year, having previously attended Birmingham.

He has made the all-state team each year in cross country, being undefeated in both track and cross country for the past two years and so far this season.

Mansfield holds the school mile record of 4:45 and the course record for two miles at Dearborn High with a time of 10:29. In addition he has the Inter-Lakes League cross country record of 11:09 and our own course record of 10:53.

Mansfield has been anchor man on the winning two-mile relay team at Central Michigan for the past three years.

Jim Bryan, also a senior and the other co-captain, placed second in the Pentathlon scoring 295 points.

Paul Lemon, a senior, was third with a 278 score.

Other trackmen who participated in these intra-squad events were R. Byrne, R. Sutherland, J. Mason, J. Brewbaker, R. Grimsaw, G. Barbour, N. Barbour, R. Goers, T. Thomas, E. Kingsley, J. Phelps and E. Bonville.

Bob Mansfield will be presented an individual trophy at the athletic assembly Wednesday, May 27, at 1:00 p.m.

Bob will enter the University of Michigan in the fall. D.A.C.
