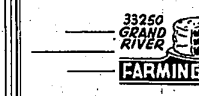

The art division exhibits will be many and varied. Mr. Ray Glenn, art instructor, revealed that the art department was displaying the paintings, drawings, copper etchings, enameling on copper, and Pottery Town prints.

The paintings include water and oil paintings. Drawings of pencil, chalk and crayon will be shown. The projects of the following students have been selected by Mr. Glenn: E. Dey, N. Fisher, D. The Homemaking department will display the garments the students have made in class during the year.

The display will consist of summer cotton dresses, wool skirts, suits, and summer party clothes.

The Mechanical Drawing classes will be exhibiting samples of the work done in class.

Their exhibit is divided into three sections, according to classes.

The first year class will display sectioning, tracing and three-view orthographics.

The second year class will exhibit auxiliary views, revolutions, dimensioning, fastening, working drawings, wood construction, assembly and detail, isometric and sheet metal.

The third year or architectural drawing class will exhibit house plans and models.

The Social Science Department has been making projects, too.

The students have been working for the past three weeks with the help of Mr. Louis Gilson and Mrs. Bernice Volmer, instructors.

Mr. Gilson and Mrs. Volmer's classes have combined efforts for this exhibit.

The Science department will contribute various types of student projects. Mr. Joseph Manz, science department instructor, states that the largest number of projects will be from the Biology I and II classes, and that he does not as yet know the nature of these projects.

The language department will display many projects that have been made by its students.

There will be dolls, maps, clay models of animals, scrap books, and paintings from both Spanish and French classes.

The projects to be shown were judged on neatness and originality.

These projects were turned in as an assignment for class work.
