To Hold Auction Sale Of Confiscated Weapons

A sale of confiscated weapons will be held early this month and the conservation department advises that lists of the firearms available may now be obtained at regional and district headquarters buildings and from the field administration division office in Lansing.

Fifty-nine rifles and shotguns are contained on the list, along with descriptive notations of design and condition of the weapons.

The lists also contain instructions to bidders as to time and place of sales, how bids should be presented and other information. Bids will be accepted until noon, May 15.

New Model Plane Contest Planned

Plymouth Motor Corporation will sponsor its Seventh International Model Plane Contest in Detroit August 19 - 24, President John P. Mansfield announced recently.

Mansfield said the International will be conducted under a new plan which will permit an increased number of youngsters, an estimated 25,000, to apply for one of the 500 places in the final contest. Invited contestants will be guests of Plymouth at the Detroit hotel for the period of the contest. There will be special events for experienced model plane builders. This year's International, for the first time, will have events for radio-controlled planes.

"We expect to demonstrate that America leads the world in model aviation," Mansfield said.

Plymouth dealers will sponsor some regional elimination contests. In addition, winners of other contests sanctioned by the Academy of Model Aeronautics will be invited.

The International contests will again be held in Detroit, with free-flight events at Selfridge Air Force Base, and control-line events at Belle Isle. More than 40 events are scheduled including competition in combat flying, Navy carrier deck operations and team racing, as well as radio-controlled flights. All previous categories of free-flight and U-control, rubber, gas and jet-propelled, speed, stunt and scale models will be retained.

Competition in radio-controlled flight will involve the use of miniature broadcasting stations. It has been made possible by the developments in radio control equipment and by the assignment of license-free frequencies for the use of model plane flyers.

STATE POLICE ARRESTS INCREASE DURING MARCH

The Michigan State Police made 7,218 arrests during the month of March, a 17 per cent increase over 6,175 the previous month. The total included 6,453 arrests for traffic offenses, an increase of 18 per cent over 5,454.

Complaints handled in all matters totalled 5,443. In addition, there were 405 cases involving delinquent wayward minors and minors violating traffic laws. These are not included in the arrest totals.

The troopers conducted 24,717 property inspections and 4,004 liquor inspections while performing regular patrol assignments.

Department vehicles traveled 944,272 miles in all activities.

The East Lansing headquarters identification bureau processed 7,018 sets of fingerprints, of which 4,799 were placed in criminal files and 2,219 in non-criminal.
