Courses Now Open For H. S. Credits

High school students who want to make up credits needed for graduation or for college entrance during the summer months may enroll now in correspondence courses offered by the University of Michigan Extension Service.

During the past school year, over 300 students from 100 high schools throughout the state have signed up for these home study courses.

Most of them were attending classes in their local high schools at the same time, but used the correspondence courses to make up credits or to study subjects which were not offered by the high schools. Among the subjects most frequently elected were Latin, advanced mathematics and commercial subjects.

Students who wish to take a correspondence course in the summer are advised by Mrs. Berenice Lee, supervisor of the University's Correspondence Study Department, to consult with their high school principal about it now. The principal can help them select the course or courses which will be most useful.

Nursing Institute To Open May 12

Preparedness for polio will be the keynote of a county nursing institute scheduled to open May 12 at St. Joseph Mercy Hospital in Pontiac. All registered nurses have been urged to participate in this program which is co-sponsored by the hospital and the Oakland County chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

Possibility of another peak polio season has spurred plans for this institute, according to Pierre Delmonstere, Farmington, newly named chairman of the county chapter. During 1952 the heaviest epidemic was recorded with 57,000 cases in the United States.

In Oakland County 358 children, men and women were stricken, greatly overtaxing facilities and personnel trained in polio care.

The institute is designed to bolster the ranks of locally trained nurses and will cover a three week period with sessions Tuesdays and Thursdays from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. Nurses may register by calling the National Foundation office, Federal 2-3361, or St. Joseph Mercy Hospital Nursing office, Federal 4-3511.

This workshop on nursing care of the poliomyelitis patient includes lectures, demonstrations and practice. All types of polio will be reviewed, also physical therapy and orthopedic.

Training will be given in administering packs, use of the chest and collar respirators, tank, rocking bed, hot pack machines and other mechanical aids.

Lecturing on anatomy, polio and related specialties topics will be Dr. Harold R. Boehm, Dr. Robert J. Mason, Dr. A. F. Calf, Dr. E. E. Hammonds, Dr. Frederick L. Adams and Dr. Robert J. Bannow.

Dr. P. B. House of Ann Arbor is consulting physiatrist. All are members of the county polio committee.

Nursing instructors, headed by Miss Marie Hickey include Miss Barbara Kemp, Miss Dorothy Williams, Mrs. Margaret Simpson and Mrs. Patricia Debits. Physical therapist Jeanne Ryskamp also will assist. All are members of the hospital staff where arrangements were completed through the cooperation of Sister M. Philippa.

Nurses taking the course are under no obligation, however, upon completion of the training could be capable of caring for polio cases in any institution. Expense of the course is covered by the "March of Dimes" fund as a community service.

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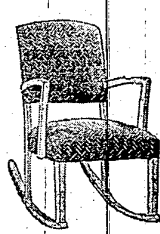
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Couple Married In East
