An Interview:

Trip West Climaxes Five Years
Of Scouting For LeRoy Paschke

A trip with all expenses paid to the National Boy Scout Jamboree in Los Angeles is LeRoy Paschke's reward for five years in active scouting.

"The main purpose of the Jamboree is to learn how to associate with others," he said.

The Jamboree will be held on the 3,000 acre Irvine Ranch, 40 miles outside of Los Angeles. The ranch is located on the Pacific coast so the boys will be able to swim frequently.

A special train will take the boys to California and will stop at such national sites as Grand Canyon, Death Valley, National Park, and Boulder Dam.

The trip, including train fare, is about \$275 and will take about ten days. The boys will leave for California July 17 and return July 23.

The Jamboree will bring together approximately 50,000 boys, who will be divided into groups and patrols such as in a regular council. There will be scouts from all over the world at the Jamboree.

A deep interest in Scouting led LeRoy to take over a group of boys at the Children's Hospital in Farmington almost three years ago. He has been going there once a week ever since.

"The boys learn very quickly and look forward to the meeting every Thursday," he said.

"Our troop at church it may take the boys weeks to learn knots, but at the hospital they learn them in just one or two weeks."

"It is an actual troop in the true sense of the word," he said. "And I try and interest the boys enough in Scouting so that when they go back home they will join a local troop."

In outside activities LeRoy has a part-time job as a gas station attendant and boy in the past three summers, worked at Camp Agawam, a Boy Scout camp, where he has been handcraft instructor and cook's assistant. LeRoy has slowly dropped out as an active Scout and now serves as a counselor and instructor.

He plans to take architectural engineering at Lawrence Tech this fall. He will continue to work in Scouting as a hobby.
