

SEVEN STUDENTS FROM AREA RECEIVE DEGREES FROM MICHIGAN STATE COLLEGE

A total of 1,933 students at Michigan State College received degrees at spring term graduation exercises held in the Macklin Field Stadium on Sunday, June 7, at 5:00 p.m.

President Frederick Lawson Hovde of Purdue University gave the commencement address. A Rhodes scholar and president of Purdue since 1946, President Hovde served as executive assistant to the chairman of the National Defense Research commission during World War II.

Of the 1,944 degrees which were awarded, 1,744 were bachelor degrees and 194 were advanced degrees. Included in the total of those receiving bachelor degrees are: Shirley A. Edgar of 33215

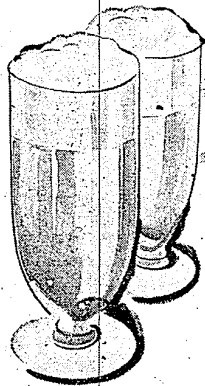

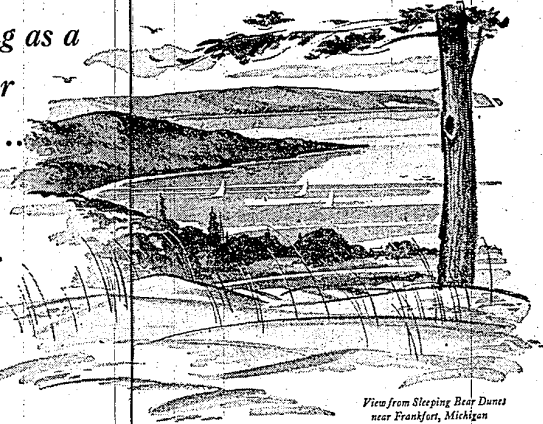

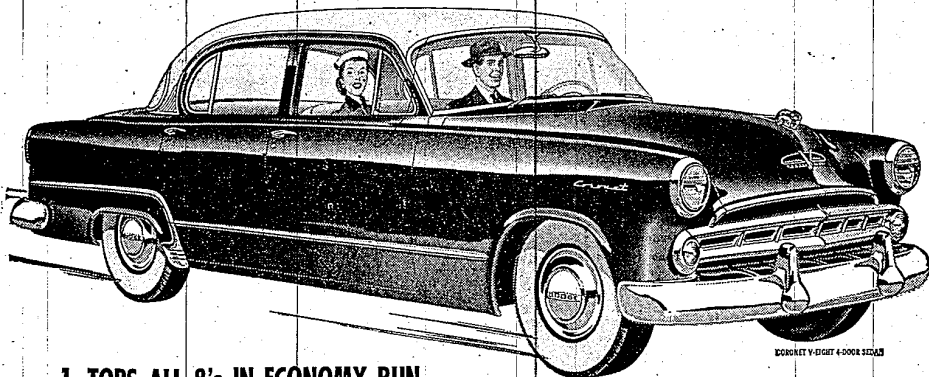
