**\$28,870 TOTAL
RAISED DURING
SEAL CAMPAIGN**

Contributions received by the Oakland County Society for Crippled Children through the recent Easter Seal campaign totaled \$28,870. It was announced this week.

The announcement was made by Mrs. Elizabeth Kirkby, the society's executive secretary. She reported that the amount represented an increase of \$10,318 over the total in 1952, when the campaign ran until July 1.

Fifty per cent of the receipts will be expended by the local society for its work in Oakland County. The remainder goes to the Michigan State Society, which provides the printed material used in the seal campaign and conducts a program for crippled children's aid in counties where there are no local chapters.

The secretary's announcement was included in the society's quarterly report for the period ending June 1, which also noted receipts amounting to \$2,216 in the form of special contributions, memberships, memorials, and gifts for special equipment, remodeling of headquarters, camp and the Rackham Institute program for education and training of cerebral palsied children and their mothers.

Disbursements amounted to \$4,995, including \$1,668 for Easter Seal campaign mailing expenses. Other disbursements were \$3,832.92 for building maintenance, administrative, office and clerical expenses, and \$1,911.68 for class work, braces and appliances, medical treatments, physical therapy, case work and teaching of the blind and patients confined to bed.

Outbreaks of the forest tent caterpillar have been known to occur in Michigan at approximately ten-year intervals. The present outbreak in the upper and northern lower peninsula started in 1947 and this year the bugs will infest about 1.2 million acres.

IN HOME ECONOMICS

Cupid is doing better by Michigan State College home economics graduates than by high school superintendents seeking teachers.

Proof of this comes from the MSC office of home economics education where the records show that 30 of this year's 54 graduates in home economics education will be married by the end of the summer.

Four of this year's married graduates will have families by the end of summer. Two other married graduates had their children with them while completing their training.

Most of the prospective husbands are MSC men — either classmates or men who have graduated. A few of the women will marry young men waiting in their home towns.

Miss Mary Lee Hurt, chairman of home economics education, says that the high school demand for teachers in that field is three times the supply of graduates. About 140 vacancies were listed for "home ec" teaching positions. Only about 30 of these have been filled. From September, 1952, to May 15, 1953, the MSC placement bureau found posts for 21 home economics teachers without experience and one experienced teacher.

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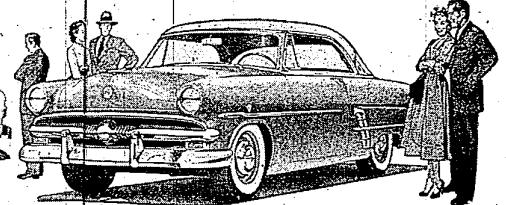
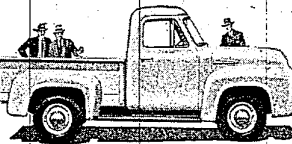
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
