Farmington Dairy Yankees Take Over First Place In L.L. Race

The Farmington Dairy Yankees held first place alone in the Little League on Monday night as Bob Utley threw a no-hitter at the Blakeslee Chevrolet Cards to shut them out 2-0. Utley's performance was almost perfect. He did not walk a man, and not a ball was hit out of the infield. His only lapse came in the fifth inning when, leading 1-0, he hit Card Catcher Fred Buesser in the head. A wild pitch and a passed ball put the only opposing base runner of the game on third base, but Utley steadied and struck out Tom Lashbrook to retire the side.

The Yankees scored in their half of the first when Tom Grimshaw beat out a leg hit. Jerry Knox dropped a bunt down; the first base line and was out at first, but Grimshaw kept running and slid under Jim Caris's tag at third, the second and final run of the game. As the Cards came to bat in the bottom of the sixth, Utley needed to retire only three batters for his no-hitter. Calm and confident, the Yankee veteran took his time — and struck out the side.

Cliff Simons was the loser, although he gave up only three hits and issued three passes, one of them intentional.

Utley was safe on Clapton's error, and Chaisson's single and a wild pitch scored both runners. The Yanks added two more in the second on singles by Chuck Habermehl and Grimshaw, a Cub error and Grimshaw's steal of home plate.

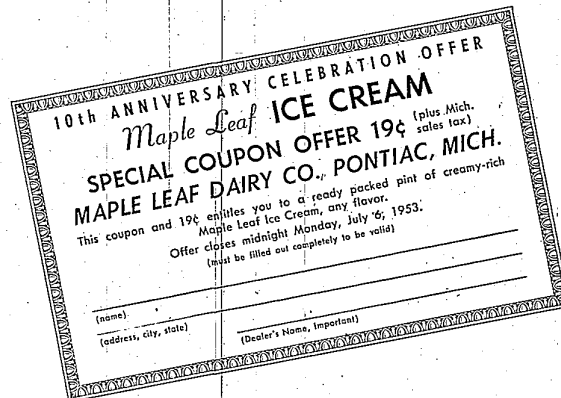
