It must be done or all our gains will be lost. Today more of our citizens die or are left permanently crippled in auto accidents than in most of our so-called dreaded diseases. There is an answer, and it must be put to work.

When an epidemic hits our community and our country, we move — and fast. We go to a door for protection and treatment and we do what he says. We don't argue with him or dispute the proved facts of his science. Yet, what happens any week end on Michigan's highways? We say, "It's terrible, what's the matter with people, anyway?"

Traffic laws, like the laws of medicine, must be enforced if this slaughter is to be eliminated. Our police and courts must prescribe a strict cure in accordance with the laws if this epidemic off traffic accidents is to be controlled. In plain, unvarnished words, we've got to get tough!
