CADET SCHREIBER BEGINS COURSE AT GEORGIA CAMP

Cadet Richard E. Schreiber, son of Mr. and Mrs. Paul R. Schreiber of 34024 Oakland, reported at Camp Gordon, Georgia, recently to begin an intensive six-week course at the United States Army Signal Corps Reserve Officers' Training Camp.

Cadet Schreiber, who is a student at the University of Michigan, and a member of the university's ROTC unit, is working on a commission as a second lieutenant in the Signal Corps Reserve.

During the six week, encampment, instruction is conducted in three phases. Individual training in general military and technical subjects is accomplished the first three weeks. Team and unit training are conducted in the field under simulated tactical conditions during the fourth, fifth and sixth weeks. Cadets will be given applied training in wire, radio, communication center, telephone and general military techniques on the division signal company level.

During off-duty hours, Schreiber will have ample opportunity to relax at the service clubs, swimming pools, golf course, motion picture theatres and other recreational facilities provided at this giant, 35,000 acre army post.

The camp will continue until July 31, at which time the cadets will return to their homes.

I am writing in reply to Mrs. Edward J. Kustron. I am 12 years old, and I live on a big farm. Before the people next door moved in, the high school boys used to sit on top of the hill, and shoot at our four horses all day. They aren't an exception!

As long as I can remember during the hunting season, my three brothers and I couldn't go outside of the lawn for fear of being shot. My horse was shot in the leg when my mother was riding her. That cost us a big veterinary bill, as she was laid up quite a while.

As for hunting being a healthy sport, I wonder if Mrs. Kustron has read the obituaries and the injuries in the paper from hunting.

There are many animals mistaken for deer and other animals that are killed or injured. At night, when the moon is out, the hunters keep on firing. If that is the breed winning husband's sport, how are they going to get up and go to work?

Most people do not use the meat that they shoot, and therefore it goes to waste. Every fall, my mother and I post no hunting signs all the way around our property (220 acres), but apparently the hunters are blind. We get tired of posting them, and you would, too.

We have seen boys as little as eight and nine years old, going around shooting, without licenses. Maybe the men who like to hunt are up in her face. She was in bed for three weeks with tetanus. She was allergic to the shot, and was very sick.

We used to patrol with the horses, but it became too dangerous for the horses and for us. We now patrol with the car. Many times we have had to call the police in at night. They have caught quite a few of the breed winning husbands who aren't going to work the next morning.

If this brings us closer to nature, I know a better way. That is, to make friends with the animals and birds, and not shoot them down like cold-blooded killers escaped from prison.

I notice that Mrs. Kustron has written quite a deal on the boys. Now I would like to express my opinion on them. I don't think that it keeps their mind on their schoolwork, because they keep thinking about where they are going to trespass next.

I think that hunting is one of our worst plagues. Yes, there are laws, but five out of six hunters never know that they exist. I hope that the people who read by letter will also consider my viewpoint too. Should we encourage hunting in the Farmington Township District?

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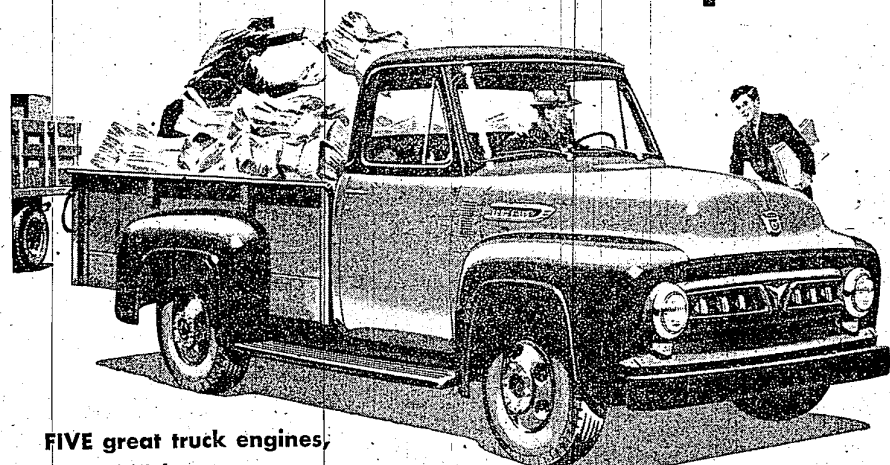
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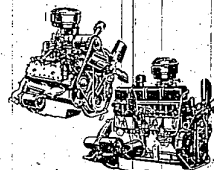
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
