One Hurt In Auto Accident On US 16

A driver suffered facial lacerations and was fined for driving while under the influence of intoxicants as a result of an accident at Grand River and Lakeway on Thursday, June 25.

James P. Curran of 19769 Niagara, Detroit 19, was removed from the scene of the accident to the Redford Receiving Hospital by Township Officer Irving Yakes. He received minor cuts about the face. Curran was fined \$100 plus \$25 costs by Judge John J. Schulte, Jr., on June 26.

According to city police reports, Curran was traveling east on Grand River at approximately 9:54 p.m. when he crashed into the rear of an automobile driven by Joseph B. Regan of 15028 Melrose, Livonia.

Regan, also headed east, was stopped near the center line at Lakeway, preparatory to making a left hand turn, when his car was struck.

The impact carried the Regan car down Grand River and the vehicle driven by Curran in turn struck a car parked in front of the American Legion Home.

CITY MAILS RECORD TAX STATEMENTS

City tax statements totaling \$63,613.33 are being mailed out this week to property owners according to Kay Cotter, City Treasurer.

This year's tax total represents the highest in the history of the city, Mrs. Cotter stated. Real estate taxes total \$48,548.78 and personal property taxes total \$15,064.55. The taxes are based on an assessed valuation of \$3,741,960.

Final date for the payment of city taxes, without penalty, has been set for August 31. A 2% penalty will be added to taxes paid between September 1 and October 31. Taxes paid between November 1 and March 1, 1954, will be charged 4% penalty.
