Christmas is still six months away.

But for the part Oakland County Chapter, American Red Cross, takes in the "Christmas on the High Seas" program for servicemen there are about three months of shopping days left.

Mrs. Murray Ashbaugh of Pontiac, new production chairman, announced the armed forces have asked that packages be mailed to reach their destinations abroad by December 1 this year instead of November 25.

"This will move up our deadline on receiving and mailing packages to about October 20," she said.

"Each of the packages should contain at least three small items like a clip-pencil, photo folder, billfold, pencil-type flashlight, pocket-size book, key ring, bottle opener, cigarette case, tobacco pouch, ball-point pen or candy in night cell phone," she added.

The Red Cross, Mrs. Ashbaugh emphasized, urgently needs the help of local people and organizations in supplying and packing the gift boxes for servicemen who will find themselves somewhere at sea on Christmas morning.
