

It is our opinion that immediate action should be taken on a definite plan to rebuild or re-route this section of road in such a way as to make it safe for traffic. We also believe that immediate steps should be taken to limit the hill to passenger car traffic only. Signs should be posted along North Farmington Road on the approaches prohibiting truck traffic. There are any number of safer routes running north and south through the city which trucks could use.

Although the latest accident on McGee Hill involved a truck, the driver was apparently not at fault. He was forced off the road by an unidentified passenger car. Yet we feel that the hill is too steep and the road and bridge too narrow to accommodate truck traffic, and we have so stated on previous occasions.
