It would give a more efficient, professionally administered government to the area, which because of the increasing number of citizens and businesses, can no longer be administered as a low density, rural community.

The League undertook the study of charters of surrounding communities and the Municipal League of Cities Model City Charter and established preferred criteria for a city charter. The members of the committee then studied the Farmington Hills Charter.

The League feels that the proposed Charter meets these essential criteria. Therefore, we strongly urge citizen support of the Charter in the May 8 election.

Farmington Democratic Club

The Farmington Democratic Club, after thorough study and discussion, wholeheartedly recommends approval of the proposed Charter for the City of Farmington Hills at the May 8 special election.

The Farmington Democratic Club supports the Charter for the following reasons:

1. Cityhood for the area which is now Farmington Township is a must to protect our borders, preserve our tax base and prevent fragmentation and uncoordinated grab of various parts of our Community.
2. The Township form of government is ill-equipped to meet even the most basic needs of a Community with a population of more than 50,000.
3. The proposed Charter is basically a good document which will permit the Community to follow a path of gradual growth while preserving many of the better qualities of township life.
4. The proposed Charter establishes a direct line between the citizens and government officials and sets up an orderly system of responsibilities to replace the present multi-headed setup under the township.
5. The proposed cityhood will bring home rule in such critical areas as roads, traffic control, and well being of the citizens.
6. The proposed Charter stabilizes the tax rate in a rational manner while providing for the Community's transitional needs.
7. The proposed Charter provides adequate methods for citizens to review, modify or change the actions of their government.

Resolution re Adoption of the Proposed Charter for the City of Farmington Hills

Whereas, the citizens of the Township of Farmington have indicated their desire to protect our boundaries, our tax base, our master zoning, sewer and water development plans, to improve our road conditions, to preserve our rural atmosphere and to provide for their needs in an orderly developmental fashion by voting to approve the drafting of a City Charter which would accomplish these ends; and

Whereas, the Charter Commission elected many months ago, after many hours of diligent study, planning and herculean effort, has drafted a Charter for the proposed City of Farmington Hills which will permit accomplishment of these goals if adopted at the election to be held on Tuesday, May 8, 1973;

Now Therefore, The Farmington Township Board does hereby encourage all our citizens to acquaint themselves with the facts, to read the proposed charter, which has been published and distributed throughout the Township, to study the issues and the qualifications of the candidates for the City Commission, to vote on May 8, 1973 in favor of adopting the charter and to elect those candidates which they judge to be best qualified to serve as members of the Council for the proposed City of Farmington Hills.

RESOLUTION
On adoption of Charter for City of Farmington Hills

Whereas, The Council of Homeowners Associations of Farmington Township Inc., was organized for the purposes of fostering, protecting and promoting the orderly growth, improvement and development of Farmington Township in accordance with its Master Plan, and those planning concepts most beneficial to its homeowners; and

Whereas, the objective of the Council is to strengthen communications and cooperation among the homeowner associations by the dissemination of information of value to the member associations; and Whereas, after lengthy study of past and projected growth in our community; and annexation attempts, both past and pending, of portions of our Township area by surrounding communities; and after studying the provisions and conditions of the proposed Charter; and

Whereas, we recognize that a Township form of government impedes and restricts the peoples' control of community growth and development and the return of local tax monies and local use thereof. It is hereby resolved, that the Council of Homeowners Associations of Farmington Township believing that its objectives and purposes can best be served by joining together as a home rule city, does here in announce its unanimous support of the proposed Charter, and encourages and promotes a "Yes" vote for its adoption at the May 8, 1973 election.

Farmington Chamber of Commerce RESOLUTION

Whereas, in order to promote the safety, health, welfare and preservation of rights and property values of the citizens of the affected communities; In order to provide the most efficient and effective form of government through Home Rule;

In order to advance the possibility of one unit of government; for, and to preserve politically the present boundaries of the total geographic community of Farmington presently known as the Township of Farmington and the Villages of Woodcreek Farms and Quakertown;

In order to protect and guard the existing tax base as a major element of support for services and public educational systems;

In order to gain a more equitable distribution of funds collected from the community for roadway and street maintenance and improvements; In order to establish controlled taxation by the electorate;

It is hereby resolved, that the Farmington Chamber of Commerce, encompassing, in part, the business and professional community of Woodcreek Farms Village, Quakertown Village and Farmington Township, does hereby endorse and support an affirmative electoral vote to adopt the City of Farmington Hills Charter as proposed and to be voted upon by the citizens on May 8, 1973.

As required by the State statutes regulating charter commissions, the Charter prepared for the proposed City of Farmington Hills was submitted to the Governor's office. It was then reviewed by the Attorney General's office to ascertain that it complied with all Michigan state statutes. The Charter was approved by the Governor with the request that two minor changes be made and these were incorporated in the document prior to final approval by the Charter Commission.

Copies of the complete text of the Farmington Hills Charter, which will be voted on next Tuesday, May 8, are available during normal office hours at Farmington Township Hall. They are available 24 hours a day at the Township Police Station, located on the ground floor of the Township Hall.
