Airman Second Class Ralph J. Klees, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph A. Klees of 9431 11th Avenue, Inglewood, California, is now assigned to Keesler Air Force Base. "The Electronics Training Center of the U. S. Air Force." The Klees family formerly resided in Farmington.

Airman Klees is taking training as a student in electronic counter-measure repairman course and upon completion of the 14 weeks course may be selected for advanced training at Keesler or assigned to duty with USAF organization in the field.

Keesler is located in Biloxi, Mississippi, on the Gulf Coast, and in its role as a technical training center it provides both USAF and Allied Nations personnel with a wide range of electronics field needed in today's Air Force around the world.

While the training program is an intensive one, base officials recognize the need for recreation and relaxation and Keesler has an extensive program of activities to meet the off-duty needs of its military personnel. Regular chapel services are conducted for all denominations and varied entertainment, including movies, dances and stage performances, is available for personnel.

Airman Klees joined the Air Force August 22, 1952, and, being an honor graduate, was selected for training at Keesler after completing his basic training at Parks Air Force Base, California.
