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HUNTING LAWS PRIME TOPIC AT STATE MEET

Deer hunting regulations are expected to snare the spotlight of the conservation commission's August 5-7 meeting at Higgins Lake training school, the conservation department notes.

At the last commission meeting Harry P. Ruhl, chief of the department's game division, gave an extended report of the 1952 season.

He also presented present herd population information and suggested November 30, last day of the regular November 15 - 30 (firearm) season, as a one-day "any deer" season north of Route M-55.

The archery deer season throughout the state has been recommended for October 1 to November 5, except in Allegan County, where an October 1 to December 15 season has been recommended. Archers may take any deer during the season, with the exception of Chippewa and Antrim counties, where only antlered deer may be taken.

As is customary, the commission will hear all delegations before setting regulations.

Richard Schreiber Ends Training In Georgia

Richard E. Schreiber, son of Mr. Paul R. Schreiber, 34024 Oakland, has just completed six weeks intensive training with the Signal Corps Reserve Officers Training Corps summer camp. He was one of approximately 1100 cadets in training at Camp Gordon, Georgia.

Attendance at summer camp is required before the ROTC cadets become eligible for commissions in the reserve.

In the early part of the training period, Schreiber had individual instruction in basic military subjects and signal communications.

Emphasis was placed on application of theories previously studied in college classrooms. Combat lessons learned in Korea and World War II were driven home by instructor personnel who are veterans of those wars. Each cadet installed and operated radio and wire network comparable to those used in an infantry division, and each student was rotated through command positions to test his ability as a leader.

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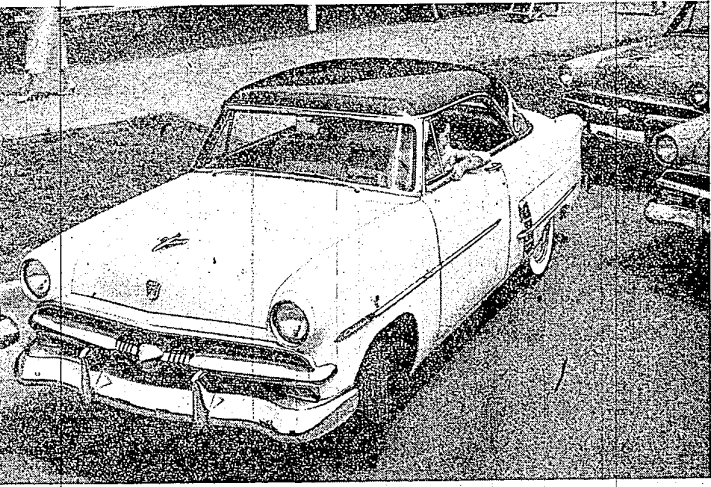
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
