

WARN MOTORISTS TO OUSE CARE ON - ORCHARD LAKE ROAD

Farmington residents are being advised to drive with extreme caution on Orchard Lake Road between 11 and 12 Mile Roads because of construction work in connection with the widening and resurfacing project.

Wherever possible, persons are urged to travel around the project zone by way of alternate routes. Work on the road is being concentrated in the 11 and 12 Mile Road section this week. Shows and bulldozers are filling and grading the shoulders and ditches, brush is being removed and utility service transferred to new poles.

(Continued from Page One) with signals facing on Grand River. The existence of the new lights had a noticeable effect on the flow of traffic over the week end. The cars were more grouped coming into the city from the east, thus allowing easier access onto Grand River from side streets. It also eliminated the heavy pile-up of cars at the main intersection of Farmington Road and Grand River in the city. Erection of the lights was approved early this spring, but due to shortages in manufacture and heavy work schedules, the installation was delayed until last Thursday. Repeated requests were made in the past few months by the Township Board, civic organizations and individuals in an effort to speed up the installation of the lights.

Fete Lee Bloomer On Anniversary

Saturday, August 1, marked 50 years of service to Michigan banking for Lee O. Bloomer, who was born and lived in Farmington for many years. Bloomer is the son of Edgar L. Bloomer, who established the Farmington Enterprise in 1883. Mr. Bloomer started in the banking business in 1903 as a secretary to G. W. McPhail. He was 17 at the time. In 1906 he went to Walkerville and opened a private bank with Mr. McPhail as partner. Later he helped organize private banks at Alden, Grand City and Elk Rapids and state chartered banks at Kalkaska, Boyne City and Mesick. He became actively associated with the Kalkaska State Bank in 1910 and has served as its president since that time. Mr. Bloomer now lives in Traverse City. In 1934 Mr. Bloomer organized the Bankers Finance Corporation which he still heads. A party was held in honor of his golden anniversary in the banking business on August 1. The affair was held at the Traverse City Golf and Country Club under the sponsorship of the directors of the Kalkaska State Bank. Mr. Bloomer's entire family was on hand with many of his friends. Everyone wished Mr. Bloomer many more years of successful banking.


