IVY POISONING
MAY REQUIRE
DOCTOR'S CARE

No person is completely immune to ivy poisoning and there is no section of Michigan where the three leaved poison ivy plant cannot be found, the Michigan Department of Health said in advising cure in avoiding the plant.

Learn to recognize the plant and stay away from it. Ivy poisoning is always unpleasant and it can be serious, causing a month-long illness which may require hospitalization.

The poison in the ivy plant is an oil which can be carried in smoke, soot, dust, on the fur of pets, garden tools, firewood or other items which have come in contact with the plant. A person may have a recurrence of ivy poisoning from wearing undecanted clothes which were worn at the time of the original contact.

First precaution is to learn to recognize the plant and avoid it. If you think you may have been exposed, wash thoroughly with a strong laundry soap, leaving the latter to dry, then rinse. If irritation occurs and blisters appear, see your doctor.

Poison ivy can be eradicated by spraying the leaves with a 2, 4-D or "ammate" solution. Spraying should be repeated every year until plants no longer appear.

In its program of approving resorts, the Department requires that poison ivy or other noxious plants either be eradicated or controlled for the protection of the public.

More than 900 colleges and universities in America are members of the A. C. P. R. A. with a large percentage of them competing each year for the national awards.



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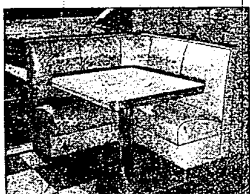
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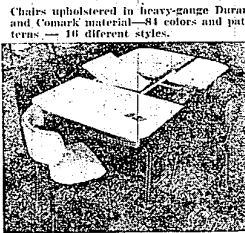
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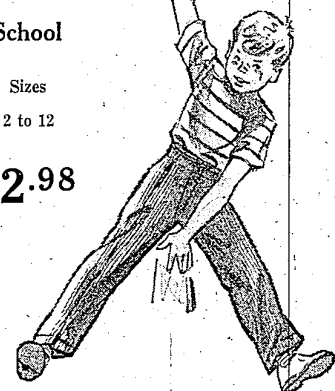
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
