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Farmington Navy Man Visits Weather Station

Nichols, 22129 Haynes Street, The Arctic Supply Group, under the command of Navy Captain C. P. Stillman, Commander Service Squadron Four, replenishes all accessible joint, Canadian - U. S. weather stations at Incheon and Mould Bay were cached for the winter.

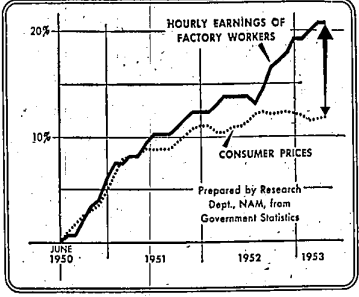
Livonia C.A.P. Takes Part In Rescue Mission

FACTORY WAGES WELL AHEAD OF PRICES SINCE KOREA



Factory employees have, on the average, fared very well in the price and wage changes which have occurred since the outbreak of war in Korea. The percentage increase in hourly pay has been almost twice as great as the percentage increase in the consumer price level, according to the official figures of the U. S. Bureau of Labor Statistics.

Most of the price increases occurred in the period between June 1950 and March 1951. But the rapid rise in prices during those nine months was matched by an equally rapid rise in the average hourly earnings of factory workers. Both increased by 8.3 percent.

After March 1951 consumer prices continued to increase, but at a very gradual rate, until the middle of 1952. Since that time there has been a slight reduction in the price level. But during all this period, while prices were increasing at a very slow rate or even declining, the earnings of factory workers kept on rising very substantially. Thus the gap between the hourly pay received by workers in manufacturing, and the cost of the goods these workers buy, has widened in favor of the workers.

Taking the period June 1950 to April 1953 as a whole, hourly pay increased 20.7 percent while consumer prices increased only 11.7 percent.

Refrigerators May Prove Death Trap For Children

Advise Getting Rid Of Replaced Unit

Abandoned or unused refrigerators are a very serious menace to children.

This fact was again brought home to mothers and fathers recently when eleven youngsters died throughout the nation within a 2-day period as a result of being trapped in these innocent execution chambers.

A number of such tragedies occur during every month of the year, according to the Institute for Safer Living of the American Mutual Liability Insurance Company, which collects facts and figures on all types of accidents.

These reasons are given for the alarming number of child "icebox" suffocations: Many families have replaced their original iceboxes and refrigerators with modern mechanical units without getting rid of the old boxes. Also some of these old iceboxes find their way to the neighborhood junk heap.

Unused and stored in out-of-the-way places, these units provide a perfect "cave," "castle," or "doll house" for childish imaginations.

Ice box deaths are needless, says the Institute. If parents would only take the precaution to see that the latch or door hinges of unused units are removed so that they cannot be locked. Children should also be well instructed to keep out of refrigerators and never to close the door when another child is inside.

Refrigerators in daily use provide a less serious menace than their discarded ancestors, but the danger is always present when the children are around. See that they know and respect this danger.

Should this type of accident continue, future public opinion may demand that refrigerators be manufactured so that the door will be released from the inside when pressure is applied, the Institute points out.

STATE TO RECEIVE NEARLY \$800,000 FOR RESTORATION

Michigan will receive nearly \$800,000 from the federal government during the coming fiscal year to help build fish and game restoration projects in the state.

Distribution of more than \$16 million to the 48 states has just been announced by the Department of the Interior.

Of the total, the state will receive \$558,000 for game work under the terms of the Pittman - Robertson act and \$215,000 for fish work under the Dingell - Johnson program.

Both those acts were set up to collect federal taxes on sales of hunting and fishing equipment to be returned to the states, earmarked for wildlife restoration purposes only. The states must provide one dollar for every three returned by the government.

Michigan, along with California and Minnesota, received the maximum amount possible under the terms of the Dingell - Johnson program.

But the state slipped to second place behind Texas this year under terms of the Pittman - Robertson program; the Lone Star state will receive about \$31,000 more than Michigan.

Michigan has ranked at or near the top under both programs since their beginnings. The monies are used for food and cover development, the purchase of hunting land and other game projects and for fishing site acquisition and other fish improvement work.

MSC Hotel Training To Begin 26th Year

Michigan State College's training program -- the second oldest in the nation -- will begin its second quarter-century of service this fall with the largest student enrollment in its history.

An expected 200 freshmen, almost twice the number who entered in the fall of 1952, will make up about one-half the entire student body of the MSC division of Michigan State University.

Today, 600 graduates of the program, conducted in MSC's unique Kellogg Center, hold positions as managers of hotels, clubs, hospitals, restaurants, industrial food services and allied businesses.

NIGHT CROOK SHUNS LIGHT

Police officials in Danville, Virginia, will await results of the community's extensive new street lighting system with professional interest, the National Street and Traffic Safety Lighting Bureau reports.

Patrol Captain W. H. Mays echoed police sentiment throughout the nation when he said, "It's a cinch that criminals are not going to work in well-lighted areas."

The Bureau reports more than 6 of every 10 major crimes are committed in the darkness, and police chiefs estimate half of these could be prevented with adequate street lighting.

REGISTRATION NOTICE FOR SPECIAL ELECTION

October 5, 1953

To the Qualified Electors of FARMINGTON TOWNSHIP, COUNTY OF OAKLAND, STATE OF MICHIGAN

Notice is hereby given that in conformity with the "Michigan Election Law", I, the undersigned Clerk, will, upon any day, except Sunday and a legal holiday, the day of any regular or special election or primary election, receive for registration the name of any legal voter in said Township, City or Village not already registered who may APPLY TO ME PERSONALLY for such registration. Provided, however, that I can receive no names for registration during the time intervening between the Thirtieth day before any regular, special or official primary election and the day of such election.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT I WILL BE AT THE TOWNSHIP OFFICE

Friday, September 4, 1953, Last Day The Thirtieth day preceding said Election

As provided by Sec. 3, Chapter 3, Part II, P. A. 300, 1921, and Sec. 1, Chapter 3, Part II, P. A. 1950, Act 31, P. A. 1941, Act 201, P. A. 1945 and Act 108, 1951.

From 8 o'clock a.m. until 8 o'clock p.m. on said day for the purpose of REVIEWING the REGISTRATION and REGISTERING such of the qualified electors in said TOWNSHIP, CITY or VILLAGE as SHALL PROPERLY apply therefor.

The name of no person but an ACTUAL RESIDENT of the precinct at the time of registration, and entitled under the constitution, if remaining such resident, to vote at the next election, shall be entered in the registration book.

ELECTOR UNABLE TO MAKE PERSONAL APPLICATION, PROCEDURE

SEC. 16. Any elector who is unable to make personal application for registration because of physical disability or absence from the Township, City or Village in which his legal residence is located, may be registered prior to the close of registration before any election or primary election by securing from the Clerk of the Township, City or Village in which he is located his legal residence, duplicate registration cards and executing in duplicate the registration affidavit before a notary public or other officer legally authorized to administer oaths and returning such registration cards to the Clerk of the Township, City or Village before the close of office hours on the last day of registration prior to any election or primary election. The notary public or other officer administering the oath shall sign his name on the line for the signature of the registration officer and designate his title.

TRANSFER OF REGISTRATION; APPLICATION, TIME

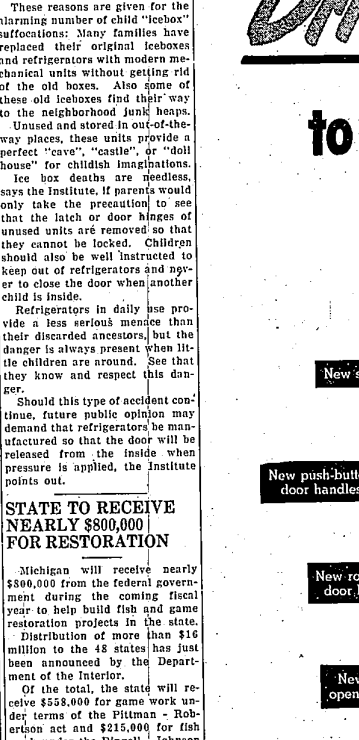
SEC. 19. Any registered elector may upon change of residence within the Township, City or Village cause his registration to be transferred to his new address by sending to the Clerk, signed request, stating his present address, the date he moved thereto and the address from which he was last registered, or by applying in person for a transfer. The Clerk shall strike through the last address, ward and precinct number and record the new address, ward and precinct number on the original and duplicate registration cards; and shall place the original registration card in proper precinct file. Such transfers shall not be made within the 30 days next preceding any election or primary election, provided that no such transfer shall permit any person to vote in any Township, City or Village in which he had not resided 30 days next preceding any election or primary election.
