## Sen. Ferguson Plans Livonia Address Sept. 13

### To Discuss Policies Of The Administration

Senator Homer Ferguson, new chairman of the Republican Policy Committee of the United States Senate, is making a state-wide tour of Michigan to report to the people on the accomplishments of President Eisenhower's administration and courses.

He will be in Livonia on September 13 to talk about what has

been going on in Washington since January and to get citizen reaction to national events.

Senator Ferguson hopes that all those who have questions or want to discuss personal matters pertaining to the Federal government will contact him when he is in their area.

President Eisenhower, in a telegram to Senator Ferguson, said his report to the people of Michigan was "an important one" and it "pleases me very much."

The text of the President's telegram follows: "Your undertaking at this time to report to the people of Michigan on the conduct of their government pleases me very much.

"I wish you would convey to them my sincere appreciation for their own interest and loyalty, and for the many fine men they have sent to Washington to help accomplish our objectives.

"Much progress has been made but even greater accomplishments are in the offing as we strive for world peace and a prosperity based on peace, not war. I am sure that this nation of Americans acting in concert and enlightened self interest can achieve prosperity with peace.

"Your report to the people is an important one and I wish you well."

## CLARENCEVILLE BOARD SETS AREAS FOR SCHOOL ATTENDANCE IN DISTRICT

The Clarenceville Board of Education recently passed a resolution regarding which school in the district students in various areas should attend.

In keeping with the Board action, the following general rules will be in effect:

The Edgewood Elementary School area shall include that part of the school district north of Eight Mile from Inster to Grand River. Both sides of Grand River from Eight Mile to Middlebelt and all north of the river from Middlebelt to Purdue. Fifth and sixth grade pupils in this area will be sent to the nearest other available elementary school.

The Westbrook Elementary School area shall be that territory west of Purlingbrook and Tuck Road including both sides of those two streets.

Eastford Elementary School area shall be all that territory

south of the high school from Purlingbrook to Angling Road to Pembroke to Inster plus the Redford Township section of the School District. The area bounded by Angling Road, Norfolk, Inster and Pembroke shall be Botsford or Central School area, depending on class loads.

Central Elementary School area shall be all the remaining sections of the district.

The School Board agreed that shifting of pupils from one area to another would be done only for the purpose of balancing class sizes and would be done at the discretion of the administration.

The Board further stated that exceptions might possibly be made if, in the judgment of school authorities, such exception would appear necessary or desirable to the school program.
