Whether the world's "little people" receive help from democratic sources or from the communists depends upon the churches, an internationally-known missionary declared at Michigan State College.

Dr. Frank Laubach, speaking at the International Council of Community Churches in conference at MSC, declared that "We must carry on a war of amazing kindness — a war against poverty, disease, illiteracy, and oppression. There is just one organization that can do that — the church."

A missionary to India for many years and originator of the "Each one teach one" plan to promote literacy in backward nations, Dr. Laubach said churches have the "wealth, talents and God — all that is necessary to bring about the greatest hour in history."

"We must carry out what the Rede has only promised," he said.

Blueberries, Rice Mold Make Tasty Desserts

LUSCIOUS, firm, cultivated blueberries served in a sauce over a rice Bavarian pudding make a delicious, eye-appealing dessert. Best in these hot days, if can be prepared in advance, and the pre-cooked rice used gives added texture to the pudding.

RICE BAVARIAN (Makes 8 servings)

One-half package (¾ cup) pre-cooked rice, 1 tablespoon gelatin, 1½ cups milk, ¼ cup granulated sugar, 1 tablespoon brown sugar, ¼ teaspoon nutmeg, ¼ teaspoon salt, 1 egg, slightly beaten, ½ teaspoon vanilla, 2 teaspoons lemon juice, 1 teaspoon lemon rind; ½ cup cream, whipped.

Prepare pre-cooked rice as directed on package. Cook. Combine gelatin and ¼ cup of the milk in mixing bowl. Mix well. Combine sugar, salt and nutmeg in double boiler. Add remaining 1 cup of milk and egg and mix well. Place over hot water and cook, stirring constantly until mixture coats spoon. Pour over gelatin and stir until gelatin is dissolved. Cook. Add vanilla, lemon juice, and lemon rind. Remove from heat and stir until slightly thickened. Then fold in rice and whipped cream. Serve with Blueberry Sauce.

BLUEBERRY SAUCE (Makes 2½ cups sauce)

Two cups fresh blueberries, 1 cup water, 4 teaspoons flour, ¾ cup sugar, ¼ teaspoon salt, dash of cloves, 2 teaspoons butter, 2 tablespoons lemon juice.

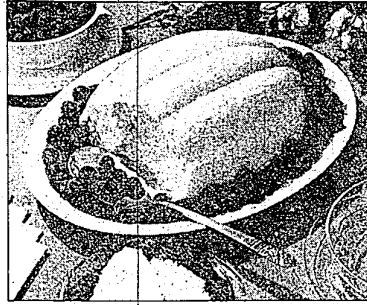
Bring 1 cup of the berries and water to a boil and simmer 3 minutes. Combine flour, sugar, salt, and cloves. Add to hot fruit. Add remaining berries, bring to a boil and cook 3 minutes. Remove from heat. Add butter and lemon juice. Serve warm, if desired.

Try this quick and easy crunchie blueberry pie for Sunday dessert:

CRUNCHY TRUE BLUE PIE

Crust: Two granary crackers, finely rolled (1½ cups crumbs), ½ cup softened butter or margarine (½ stick), ¼ cup sugar.

Blend granary crackers, softened butter or margarine and sugar. Form mixture into 9-inch pie plate. Firmly press into an

even layer against bottom and sides of plate. Bake in moderately hot oven (375 deg. F.) about 8 minutes. Cool.

Filling: Two and one-half tablespoons cornstarch, 2 tablespoons sugar, 1 cup water, 1 quart cultivated blueberries, 1 teaspoon lemon juice. Mix cornstarch and sugar. Gradually add water and stir until cornstarch and sugar dissolve. Add to berries and cook over low heat, stirring constantly until mixture thickens and becomes clear. Remove from heat, add lemon juice. When thoroughly cool, pour into granary cracker crust. Chill. Just before serving, garnish with whipped cream.

TURKEY SHOULD NOT BE LIMITED TO THANKSGIVING

Turkey needn't be limited to the Thanksgiving and "week following" menus these days. The rather new breed of tender small-size Beltsville White turkeys is becoming increasingly popular for year around fare.

Here's how to broil one of these small turkeys as recommended by home economists of Michigan State College.

First, split the turkey down the back, remove the breastbone and divide the bird in half. Remove the drumsticks, thighs and wings, and carefully cut out the bones.

Prepare a stuffing for the turkey, allowing three cups of bread for a four-pound bird. Put a spoonful of stuffing into the neck and legs and wings, and sew or skewer them neatly to the body.

Coat the turkey halves with melted fat and sprinkle them with salt and pepper. If you like, you can dust the turkey with flour.

Start cooking the bird with the skin side away from the heat. Turn and broast it frequently while broasting.

When the meat is nearly cooked, turn the turkey halves skin side down on the broiler rack and fill each cup-shaped half with stuffing. Return it to the broiler to finish cooking the meat and to brown the stuffing.

Serve the turkey on a hot platter, skin side up, with the browned stuffing underneath.
