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STATE POLICE ARREST 6,897 DURING JULY

Michigan State Police made 6,897 arrests, including 5,951 for traffic offenses, during July, according to the monthly activity report compiled by the department. Arrests increased 50 per cent over the 4,595 made during June when general police activities suffered a sharp decline due to special details assigned to the Flint tornado disaster and the upper peninsula search for Marquette prison escapees.

July traffic arrests increased 57 per cent over the 2,738 made during the previous month. Not included in the arrest totals were 946 juvenile offenses, involving delinquent and wayward minors and juvenile traffic law offenders. Troopers also made 17,706 property inspections and 5,330 liquor inspections. There was a total of 1,564 complaints handled in all matters and 916,443 miles were traveled in connection with all departmental activities.

The East Lansing headquarters received 5,915 sets of fingerprints, 5,238 criminal and 3,677 non-criminal. In processing 530 sets of fingerprints submitted in connection with applications for licenses to carry concealed weapons, 61 applicants were found to have criminal records. Likewise, 29 persons wanted by police as fugitives from justice were identified through fingerprints.

The bureau compiled 2,917 criminal records and furnished 8,271 copies of the records to various agencies.
