Salmon and Rice Mold Late Summer Treat

A RICH, beautiful-to-look-at jellied salmon and rice mold makes the perfect dish for your late summer porch party, your Labor Day at home, or for your canasta luncheon.

Served with warm French bread and iced tea, it's quite an event in itself.

SALMON RICE MOLD WITH ASPIC

One recipe easy tomato aspic, 1 cup hot water, 1/2 cup cold water, 2 tablespoons vinegar, 1/2 cup mayonnaise, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 1 teaspoon ground onion, 1 cup (7-ounce can) red salmon, drained and flaked, 1 cup diced celery, 2 tablespoons chopped dill pickle.

Prepare easy tomato aspic as directed below and pour into 2-quart ring mold. Chill until almost firm.

Meanwhile, prepare pre-cooked rice as directed on package. Cool to room temperature.

While rice is cooling, dissolve gelatin in hot water. Add cold water, vinegar, mayonnaise, salt, pepper and onion. Mix well. Chill until slightly thickened.

Then add salmon, celery, dill pickle and the cooled rice. Pour over tomato aspic layer. Chill until firm. Unmold and garnish with crisp salad greens.

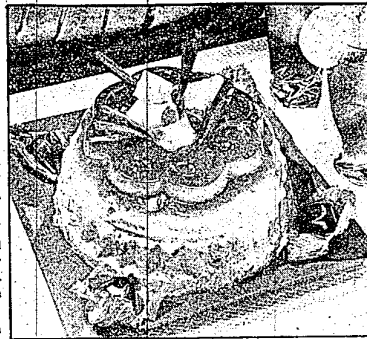
Serve with additional mayonnaise. Makes 8 to 10 servings.

Easy Tomato Aspic: Dissolve 1 package lemon-flavored gelatin in 1 1/4 cups hot water. Add 1 can (8 ounces) tomato sauce, 1/2 teaspoon salt and dash of pepper. Blend.

For breakfast or afternoon tea or coffee, these pineapple muffins are going to make a lot of people happy. They are made with non-fat dry milk—in an easy way to economy.

Pineapple Muffins

Two cups sifted flour, 3 tablespoons non-fat dry milk, 2 1/2 teaspoons baking powder, 2 tablespoons sugar, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup shortening, 2 eggs, 1 flat can crushed pineapple (1 cup), undrained.

Sift together flour, non-fat, dry milk powder, baking powder, sugar and salt into mixing bowl. Cut in shortening. Beat eggs and stir in undrained crushed pineapple. Add to dry ingredients. Stir only until flour is dampened. Spoon into greased muffin pans, filling each well about 3/4 full. Bake at 400 degrees F. (hot oven) 12 to 25 minutes. Makes 10 large or 36 very small testime muffins.

Taylor Urges
Safety Program
For ChildrenResponsibility Placed
With Parents, Motorists

Superintendent of Public Instruction Clair L. Taylor this week announced the opening of a statewide traffic safety emphasis program aimed at reducing accidents to school children.

Right after Labor Day 1 1/2 million children will return to school and there will begin the strenuous movement of children to and from schools every week day. The superintendent said 140,000 of these will be attending school for the first time and motorists must recognize that this is a brand new experience for these children.

According to the Superintendent, never in the history of Michigan has there been so great a number of children of such a number of cars on the highway and unless we redouble our safety efforts sheer mathematics will give Michigan the blackest traffic record in years. Mr. Taylor said, "I have confidence that we will win this challenge. Michigan motorists know that children have been away from their schools and the influence of their safety programs. They will be expecting them to do childish and unusual things."

Commenting on the personal responsibility of adults, Superintendent Taylor said: "I want to urge every motorist to do one thing this year and that is upon sight of any child repeat the September campaign slogan, 'Watch Out For Kids.' We all have a personal motive because they may be your children or mine. At any rate, where there is a parent at home anxiously awaiting the safe arrival of every one of these children."

"The prime responsibility rests with the motorist because no parent can be at the side of each child all day. The few minutes required to slow down for children is a small investment that will pay a rich dividend and it will protect a valuable possession, your driver's license."

In conclusion, Superintendent Taylor added, "this program is sponsored by the Michigan State Safety Commission and the Michigan Traffic Safety Federation, representing over 100 organizations interested in safety. Special assistance is being given by the Michigan Oil Industry Information Committee and it is a fine example of coordination and cooperation between public and private agencies working together through the leadership of the Commission to save lives on Michigan highways."

Henry Chavey of Westmore Avenue is quite ill and undergoing treatment at Henry Ford Hospital.

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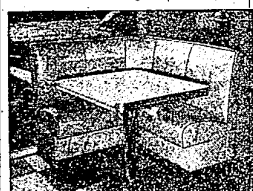
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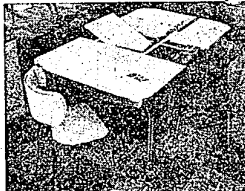
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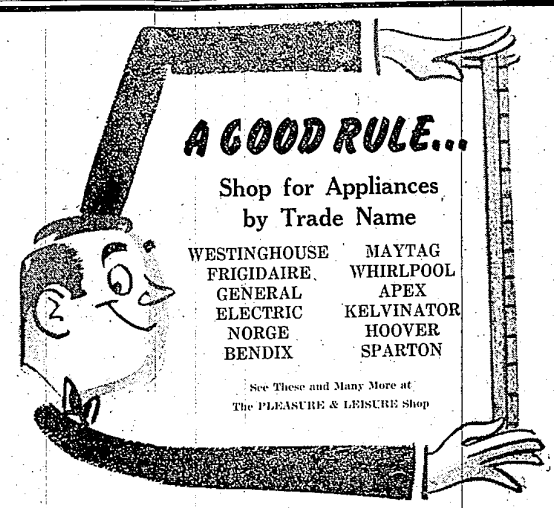
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
