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Oakland Chapter Red Cross To Start Course

Need Social Welfare Workers With Training

Oakland County Chapter, American Red Cross, will start a new training course October 15 to help volunteers to help servicemen and their families with problems.

First session of the new course for social welfare aides will be Thursday, October 15, at 9:30 a.m. at Birmingham Community House.

Volunteers themselves will set up the exact schedule of their 20 hours of instruction in social work. Red Cross regulations and community resources available.

Miss Everett C. Sparlock, the Red Cross chapter's home service director, and Mrs. P. S. Johnson of Pleasant Ridge, home service committee chairman, will supervise the training.

Welfare aides work with the Red Cross staff in helping the active servicemen and his family with problems, especially those imposed by separation due to military service. They also act as "liaison men" when a family is burned out or otherwise in trouble, lining up clothes, volunteer help, and perhaps even food and shelter.

LAWRENCE TECH PLANS TO HONOR INVENTOR OF GEAR

Lawrence Institute of Technology will award an honorarium to Jack Walden, who was graduated from L.I.T. in the class of 1949 in aeronautical engineering.

Walden, it now has been revealed by the Navy Department, designed the hydro-ski landing gear installed on the Navy's recently announced "Sea Darts" which allows land-based type planes to land and take off from a water or snow surface without compromising performance and normal runway operation.

Walden was killed two years ago in Wilmington, Delaware, as he was testing the hydro-ski for the Navy Department. At that time the Navy kept secret the circumstances of the accident.

Walden's invention, it appears, may revolutionize the entire aviation industry when it is released for private use. The commercial application of such a type of universal landing gear could bring the airplanes closer to cities situated on rivers and harbors and eliminate much of the need for close-in airports.

At the time of Walden's death the former Navy pilot was an engineer with the All American Engineering Company in Wilmington.

"Hundreds of landing and take-off operations from water, grass, mud, paved runways and snow have been made by ordinary land planes equipped with this landing gear," stated Donald B. Doolittle, chief engineer of All American.

"Sufficient development and tests have been conducted to conclude that the use of this operation in harbors, lakes, or any relatively protected waters is entirely practicable."

Dr. E. George Lawrence, president of L. I. T., said the college will award an honorary doctor's degree in aeronautical engineering with Mrs. Walden, now a resident of California, accepting it for her husband. He said that the voluminous degree would be awarded as soon as arrangements can be made for Mrs. Walden's attendance.

STATE TO SELL SEEDLINGS, TREES FOR FALL PLANTING

Fourteen million seedling and transplant trees are available for the fall forest planting season from conservation department's three state nurseries, P. J. Hodge, in charge of the program reports.

The trees are available for forest plantings, erosion control work, as farm windbreaks and for Christmas tree production. They will not be sold for ornamental plantings or for resale with roots attached.

The fall planting season generally runs from September 15 to November 1, though those dates vary somewhat with weather conditions.

Red, white, Jack and Scotch pine and some white spruce are available. Prices range from \$5 to \$5 per thousand and from \$15 to \$18 for transplants.

Full details, including a price list and order blanks may be obtained from the department's forestry division, Lansing.

To ride at half fare when full fare is required is definitely dishonest, though the money value of the transaction is small even to a twelve year old.

There is a general trend in the direction of dishonesty and shady practice all around us. It has reached a point where some individuals become so believe that laws and regulations are not for them, just for the other fellow. As long as they are not caught in their falsehoods and sharp practices, they feel perfectly justified in doing the things which suit them. The questions of Honesty, Integrity, Responsibility and Duty are apparently not thought of or considered.

My grandson with Miss Twelve Year Old developed the subject of honesty within herself as opposed to dishonest acts even in little things.

Breaking rules is a bad habit to develop because as the practice is indulged in, the stronger the desire becomes to invade more lucrative fields. Rule breakers always get caught sooner or later. Laws, rules, regulations and the like come into being for particular purposes and are to be obeyed by all; not to be invoked, altered or disregarded by any individual or group.

OFFER COURSES ON CENTRAL EUROPE AT WAYNE UNIV.

Two courses dealing with Mid-European future will be conducted at Wayne University this year under the Department of Slavic Languages and Literature, it was announced this week.

The new program has been underwritten by the Mid-European Study Center, an organization under the National Committee for Free Europe.

Entitled "Roots of Mid-European Unity", the first semester course will cover the geographical, economic and political factors leading toward federal reorganization. Starting in February the follow-up class will deal with Mid-European and its contributions to Western Culture.

Instructors from the history and Slavic languages and literature departments will cooperate in teaching the courses.

State Plants 5,500 'Trained' Trout

Fifty-five hundred legal-sized trout from the conservation department's fish "school" at Oden hatchery were being planted in five areas of the northern lower peninsula this week, the first such trained fish to be released.

The fish were taught to feed and forage and avoid predators in such a way as to make survival under stream conditions more possible. In the past, hatchery-reared fish have lost out by not knowing how to adapt to stream conditions after planting.

Training was under direction of the Psychological Research Associates, Inc., and was carried on for a period of five weeks.

A group of 40-50 newspapermen, fish division workers and others witnessed effects of the training at a demonstration held at the hatchery late last week. Differences between the behavior of trained fish and those treated under the old system of rearing were readily obvious, witnesses said.

The fish are being planted in Slagle and Hunt Creeks, in the Erie and Pigeon Rivers, and in Guiley Pond. All are either tagged or fin-clipped so results of the experiment may be checked from actual catches.
