Duck Hunting Rules Same For Canada, Mexico

If you're going duck hunting in Canada or Mexico this fall, you will again, as usual, have to comply with certain requirements when bringing your catch into the United States.

Migratory game birds brought or shipped from Canada, if dressed, must have the head, head plumage and feet attached. Shipments from Canada must also be accompanied by tags or permits if required by provincial or dominion law. Somewhat similar rules

apply to birds imported from Mexico, the conservation department notes.

Tag limits and further specific details of these regulations may be obtained from the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service in Washington.
