The state-wide drive over the Labor Day week end to crack down on dangerous drivers was participated in by the Farmington Police Department, which issued a total of 67 violation tickets from Friday through Monday night.

Madonna College Opens Sept. 14

Freshmen at Madonna College will begin their orientation next Monday, September 14. Resident freshmen will arrive Sunday before 8:00 p.m. and day students will be on campus Monday morning before 9:00.

Extending from September 14 to 16, the Freshmen Days aim to give new students an initial orientation before the opening of classes.

Under the guidance of upper classmen, particularly their Big Sisters, freshmen will be conducted through the campus to view the buildings and grounds - with a visit to the chapel, the administrative offices, the dining hall, the dining room and the snack bar.

Preliminary inventories of occupational interests and several tests will be administered to the students as an effective aid in counseling during the school year.

The Dean and Registrar will acquaint the freshmen with the ideals and organization of the college and the coming semester's program.

Included on the three-day program prepared by the Student Association are lighter moments - such as the wicker roast, sports, games, hike, and the student faculty tea.

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"Why does my cow's milk vary in butterfat test from month to month?"

That's a question many dairy farmers ask Michigan State College dairymen. The scientists say the variation usually is normal. They say these variations are due to two weeks after freshening, milk from cows in good condition may test high. This is temporary and generally milk will test least soon after the first calving. As the cow's lactation, then the test increases. It's usually highest near the end of the lactation period.

Milk usually tests highest during the coldest winter months, then decreases with warmer weather. The test is lowest during June or July or during spells of hot, humid weather. It rises again later until the peak is reached in January or February.

The shorter the time between milkings, the richer the milk. And the completeness of milking affects the test because foremilk often is thin, while skim milk may be very rich.

The fat content of milk from different quarters of the same cow is not constant. Certain breeds give higher fat content milk than others.

Underfeeding tends to increase the test of milk, but it decreases the milk yield to a greater extent. Night milk is usually higher in test than morning's milk.

The milk of a fairly large herd is reasonably constant in its fat content, because it is a mixture of many samples of milk.
