"Why does my low's milk vary in hutterfat test from month to month." That's a question many dairy farmers ask Michigan State College dairymen. The scientists say the variation usually is normal. They cite these examples:

Two weeks after freshening, milk from cows it good condition may test high. This is temporary and generally milk will test least during the first few months of a cow's lactation. Then the test increases. It's usually highest near the end of the lactation period.

Milk usually tests highest during the coldest winher months, then decreases with warmer weather, the test is towest during June or July or during sigilis of hot, hundwester. It rises again later until the peak is reached in January or Febriary.
