FLOWERING BULBS NEED INSPECTION BEFORE SALE

Act 189 of the Public Acts of Act 139 of the Phillic Acts of 1931, as amended, jequires that perennial flowering bulbs, such as fullps, narcissus, hylentils, and IIIIIes, must be inspected and existed prior to being offered for sale. Growers' projucing such bulbs for sale also mist be licensed under the sime ack. Likewise, persons or firms who buy and self flowering, bulbs are required to have a plant dealer's license.
