BAND, GLEE CLUB BEGIN 1953 SEASON WITH FULL SCHEDULE AT MICH. STATE.

Faced with busy schedules of appearances, Michigan State College's marching band and men's glee club reported for a week each of training and rehearsals before the beginning of the autumn term at M.S.C.

The 120 members of the band spent a week of drills and rehearsals at M.S.C. under the direction of Leonard Falcone who this year begins his 27th year as Michigan State band director. In addition to appearing at home games of the football Spartans, the band will perform at Minnesota and Ohio State under the sponsorship of the Oldsmobile division of General Motors.

The men's glee club received a week of training and rehearsals at Yonkers Springs in southwestern Michigan. The first annual choral clinic was equivalent to two terms of rehearsals on campus, according to Director Edward Richmond.

Appearances by the 60-voice group during the year will include Saint Louis, Marquette, Escanaba, Iron Mountain, Houghton, Ironwood, Detroit, Grand Rapids, Dearborn and Birmingham.

NEW TRAFFIC CASUALTY MARK SET IN AUGUST

Although the death toll was slightly less than in the same month a year ago, more persons were injured in traffic accidents in Michigan during August than in any previous month on record.

The State Police monthly statistical report shows 5,523 persons injured in 14,920 accidents. This was an increase of 20 per cent over 4,625 injured in August a year ago and a gain of 3 per cent over 12,594 accidents.

Deaths totalled 180, or four less than in the same month of 1952, but 30 higher than the average for August during the past two years of 1946 to 1952.

The record for the first eight months of this year includes 1,163 persons killed, 36,806 injured and 116,783 accidents. Deaths increased 10 per cent, injured 20 per cent and accidents 13 per cent over the same period last year.

Estimated mileage for the first seven months of this year, the latest information available, is 15.1 billion, a gain of 10 per cent over 13.7 billion for the same period in 1952. The death rate of 6.6 per 100 million miles of travel was up three per cent over 6.4.

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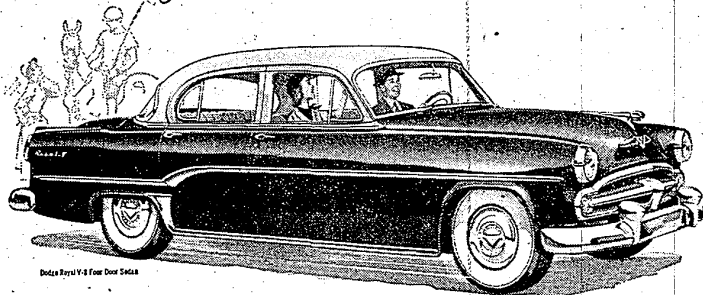

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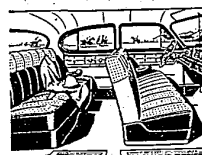
