POLISH WILL HARM LEATHER, SPECIALIST SAYS

Steer clear of furniture polish when caring for leather upholstery — or for imitation leather or plastic.

Luelle Ketchum, extension home management specialist at Michigan State College, gives these rules for proper care of leather upholstery.

Dust regularly with an untreated, dust cloth. Never apply furniture polish to leather. A slightly dampened cloth may be used about every fourth time to remove soil.

When leather becomes soiled, clean with saddle soap. Select a soap that conditions as well as cleans the leather. Apply a heavy lather with a slightly moist sponge or cloth. Allow to dry thoroughly. Then wipe and polish with a soft dry cloth. Cream furniture waxes are also good on leather and plastic upholstery.

Regular care for imitation leather or plastic is the same as for leather.

When the surface of imitation or plastic becomes soiled, clean with a cloth wrung out of warm suds made by using a milk soap or synthetic detergent. Rinse with a cloth wrung out of clear warm water. Wipe with a dry cloth.

Miss Ketchum includes a tip for preparing the "slightly dampened cloth" used in so many cleaning chores.

Dip one-third of a clean soft cloth in water; wring slightly. Fold the cloth in thirds, so that the dampened portion is between the dry portions. Wring the folded cloth until the moisture is evenly distributed throughout.

Skaffe, field secretary for the national committee for the Defense of Democracy through Education, and Robert Vogeler, assistant vice-president of International Telephone and Telegraph Company, are the speakers for the first general session.

Gertrude Matson, Berkley grade school teacher, is chairman of the conference; the secretary is Mildred Porritt, teacher at Wilbur School in Pontiac, and Eldon Robinson, high school teacher at Royal Oak, is regional executive secretary committee chairman.
