'Trout Pullman' Test Is Planned

Frisky trout will be given sleeping potions in a series of tests aimed at reducing costs of trout planting, the conservation department reports.

Carried in large tank trucks to streams and lakes, trout have posed a problem in the past by taking up too much room in the transport tank with their rambling antics.

Sodium amyltal will be mixed with water in the transport tank to turn the trout into a "trout Pullman". The drug is expected to quiet the fish so more can be carried on each trip.

California fisheries workers pioneered the method, and report in some cases they are able on long hauls to carry twice as many fish as previously.

Once returned to untreated water, the fish revive and show no after-effects from the snooze.

Some of the drug will be purchased to be used soon in experiments from the Wolf Lake hatchery.

School Children's Sleep Needs Told

Your child will benefit more completely from his school opportunities if he is fully rested when he leaves home in the morning, Dr. Joseph G. Molner, Detroit commissioner of health, suggests to parents.

To make sure that your child is rested and ready for new responsibilities and ideas, requires careful planning but constant supervision by the parents is needed to see it through.

The number of children who take naps in the daytime drop sharply at five years when they start to kindergarten. See that your child is not short changed in the sleep he gets at night. A child who is new to the large groups he mingles with in the schoolroom is likely to be so keyed up by his school experience that he has very great need for planned rest at home. The kindergarten should be in bed by 8:00 if he is to be up at 7:00. If your child is nervous or tired by the middle of the morning, chances are home conditions and home planning should be improved.

Elementary school children need nine to eleven hours sleep, depending on their age, general health and physical make up. In general, teen-agers need at least eight to nine hours sleep. A good general rule is to see that a school-age child goes to sleep early enough to awaken naturally in the morning. A little experimentation will determine whether being allowed up an extra fifteen minutes at night means "dopey".

Many an energetic child hates to be inactive but he needs some relaxation if he is not to be over-stimulated. Radio and television programs should be turned off and homework completed before bedtime so that a quiet period of relaxation is enjoyed before the child goes to bed. Old familiar stories are more relaxing than new exciting ones. Parties for students should be saved for Friday and Saturday.

In discussing the difficulty of having children turn off radio and television programs, Dr. Molner reminds parents that teen-agers feel less frustrated when they have a voice in working out plans to rest sufficient sleep. But the last word must remain with parents where the young person's health is concerned.

Find Lake Trout In Tamarack Creek

Conservation department fisheries specialists are still puzzled over the occurrence of lake trout in Tamarack Creek, Montclair County.

"It still has me very much up a tree," says Fred A. Westerman, chief of the department's fish division.

Two of the fish were taken from the creek recently and reported by a Grand Rapids newspaperman. Checks established that other anglers had also taken lake trout from the creek previous to the reported catch.

Lake trout are native to the Great Lakes, where they are born, live and die. Spawning does not occur in streams. And a check of fish division records shows that no lake trout plantings have ever been made on inland lakes of the area where the fish were caught.

Fisheries workers have planned to test shock portions of the creek after trout season closes to see what further can be learned about the situation.
