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ZIPPER CAUSE
OF SPOTS IN
WASH DRESS

Many homemakers have had cause to complain about mysterious brown spots and holes that sometimes appear in cotton wash dresses when they're being ironed.

Textiles specialists at Michigan State College received information on this problem which resulted from research by textile chemists of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

It was found that chemical action producing an acid was set up when dampened fabrics were kept in contact with certain zippers for some time before ironing. The zippers, it was found, caused trouble were made of a combination of two metals, such as copper and aluminum.

The trouble seems to come from a combination of a zipper made of two metals, plus water, plus a substance to conduct electricity. This substance might be provided by the minerals in hard water, salt found in starch, or some detergent not entirely removed, by rinsing.

To protect wash dresses which have two-metal zippers against brown spots and holes, clothing and textile authorities at M.S.C. suggested these precautions:

One, avoid sprinkling and rolling up for ironing by drying the garment quickly and ironing it before it is completely dry.

Or two, if it must be dampened for ironing, fold the zipper outside, keep the fabric around the zipper dry, and iron soon.

NOTED FRENCH
ORGANIST TO PLAY
AT ST. JOHN'S

The fourth annual Fall Music Festival has been set for the three evenings of October 25, 26 and 27 at 8:30 p.m. in St. John's Episcopal Church, Woodward at Verbor.

The opening program will feature the 40-member choir with organ and strings, under August Maekelberghe, St. John's musical director and internationally known composer and concert artist. The moving "Requiem" of Fauré will be heard, and the exquisite "Lauda Sion" of Buxtehude, scored for harpsichord and strings to accompany the voices. Monday and Tuesday evenings, October 26 and 27, will mark the first Detroit engagement of Andre Marchal, world-famous French organist.

The Fall Music Festival is co-sponsored by historic and widely known St. John's Parish, which houses one of the best recital organs in this region. The festival is non-profit, non-denominational, and is made possible by the patronage of individuals and groups in and around Detroit. Its primary policy and effect is to offer not only one distinctive evening of music especially prepared by long-familiar Detroit Personnel. Another outstanding organist is invited each year, to further the enjoyment of the vast resources of traditional and "new" organ music, secular and sacred.

Earlier St. John's festivals have presented the Italian Flauto Pecters, among the foremost of contemporary composers; Fernando Germani, first organist at the Vatican; and Miss Claire Coci, brilliant American musician and teacher who was appointed organist with the New York Philharmonic Orchestra shortly before her two concerts in Detroit last fall.

There is no ticket sale for the festival programs, and no reserved seats. Voluntary contributions to augment the festival fund are welcome during the concerts, but optional.

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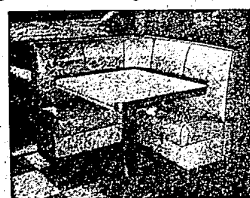
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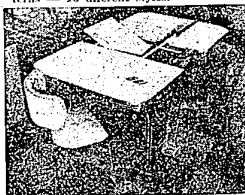
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
